

AMERICA'S DRIFT TOWARD DICTATOR SEEN BY JENKINS

Country Treading Path of Rome and Greece, Klamath Publisher Tells Rotarians—Happy Ending Seen

Speaking before more than 100 Medford and Grants Pass Rotarians and their ladies at St. Marks parish hall last night, Frank Jenkins, Klamath Falls newspaper publisher, declared that "we must reassess our powers we have been shoving off onto one man or America will end in dictatorship."

Analyzing the new trends in business, government, finance and labor, Jenkins said, "For four years we have been increasing the powers in the hands of one man. For four years we have been drifting toward a one-man government. We are treading the path that Rome and Greece trod in ancient days, and that Italy, Germany and Russia trod in recent years."

Seeing Final Turn. Closing his address, which held the large crowd spellbound, for the better part of an hour, Jenkins stated that it was his belief, however, that at the last minute "our fundamental strength of fibre and common sense will reassert itself and we will gradually cure the ungodly things we are doing."

Speaking of finance, Jenkins said that America, four years ago, embarked upon the greatest campaign of spending in the history of the world. The theory, he stated, was to "take it from those who have and give it to those who haven't because the latter are better spenders." However, he said, wealth and progress arise out of human labor, that unless we earn our money by labor, business cannot be helped by the spending of that money because we aren't creating.

Like shot in Arm. He likened our tremendous spending campaign to a shot in the arm that when the effect wore off we needed another shot, in this case, more money being spent. He stated the trend was very definite toward inflation if we continue to spend what we don't earn.

Jenkins paid special tribute to the saving man, declaring that only by saving money, he said, a man can accumulate a fortune of \$10,000, with which to purchase machinery and other production necessities, could we progress and make this a better country in which to live.

"Taxation must follow spending," Jenkins stated. "Spending, followed by inevitable taxation, robs the man who thinks he is benefited by it. In the long run, it is the man who draws the pay check that pays the taxes."

Labor Too Powerful. Jenkins declared that labor, today, has altogether too much power, but that capital and the employer need only itself to blame. For years, he said, the "boss" treated his employees like they weren't human. Now, he said, the balance of power has swung to the other side. He stated that he believed that out of the present labor chaos, "employers will learn how to treat their employees like human beings instead of commodities and will share their prosperity with them, as well as their hardships."

In conclusion, Jenkins said that if the relationship between employer and employee becomes more steady, these chaotic years have not been in vain.

The Rev. E. B. Bartram was master of ceremonies at the banquet, introducing Jenkins and the visiting Grants Pass Rotarians. Mary Ann Gates and Clarence Smith sang three songs, accompanied by Lillie Ellenburg. They were "Into the Dawn With You," "Love Me Tonight," and "Because You're You." The songs were extremely well received.

Following the banquet, the gathering enjoyed dancing and cards.
