

# Junior Gridmen End Season Thursday in Clash Here With G. Pass

## ELEVEN OF SQUAD LEAVE IN SPRING FOR SENIOR HIGH

Game Scheduled for 3 P. M. On Van Scoyoc Field — Coach Harrington Plans to Try for Repeat Win

Medford junior high's fast-moving grid machine writes final to a successful season Thursday when it faces the strong Grants Pass junior high aggregation at Van Scoyoc field, the battle starting at 3 o'clock sharp.

The game will mark the last appearance of eleven gridmen in junior high uniform, all being graduated next spring into high school. The future Medford Black Tornado stars will turn on the heat tomorrow in an attempt to repeat their last week's 14-0 victory over the Grants Pass outfit, gained as Coach George Harrington threw his entire squad of 40 players into the battle.

Harrington, handling junior high athletics for the first time this season, has developed a powerful team that, starting slowly, has picked up momentum to top the last two ball games. Only defeat suffered by the locals from another junior high team was to Ashland, 12-0, early in the year. The locals later crushed the Lithia City eleven under a seven-touchdown barrage.

After several days intense practice, Coach Harrington announced his starting lineup as follows: Ray Lile and Curt Hopkins, ends; Jack Keaveny and Jack Flory, tackles; Oliver Snow and Andy Jones, guards; Claude Jones, center; Dean Grimes, quarterback; Eugene Hayes and Ray Johnson, halfbacks; and Louie Thurman, fullback.

Don James has been staging such a spirited bid for the quarterback post that he will see plenty of action, Harrington said. Because of his blocking ability, he has also learned the guard assignments and may go in at one of those slots, the coach said. Stars in the junior high line are Jones, center; Flory, tackle; and Hopkins, end. Louie Thurman, triple threat fullback, provides most of the team's offensive punch.

## ROSE BOWL TICKETS SAME AS LAST YEAR

PASADENA, Cal., Nov. 17. — Tournament of Roses officials claimed today there had been a mistake in the announcement of ticket prices for the New Year's day football game in the Rose Bowl.

William Dunkerly, secretary-manager, said the prices will be the same as last year—\$3.00 for box seats, \$4.00 for seats between the 20-yard lines, and \$3.50 for the end seats.

Last year several thousand seats at \$2.20 were quickly sold out. There won't be any this time, Dunkerly said.

## Harvard Pickets Ticket Scalpers

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 17. —(AP)—Speculators on Harvard-Yale football tickets today were driven to cover by "sandwich men" bearing signs which read: "Scalp the scalpers. Scalpers are unfair to Harvard men." The picketing was conducted by two Harvard students, who reported speculators were asking as much as \$50 for a pair of seats for Saturday's game.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 17. —(AP)—Baby Arizmendi's flailing fists spoiled a coming-out party for Bus Breeze, Kansas lightweight.

Piling up points in the early fighting, the Los Angeles Mexican won a 10-round decision from the Kansan in his local ring debut last night. Arizmendi, 131, suffered an eye cut when he collided with Breeze's head. The latter scaled 155.

## Baseball Pioneer To Highest League

CHICAGO, Nov. 17. —(AP)—Norris J. "Tip" O'Neill, 70, one of the few remaining pioneers of baseball, died today.

O'Neill, one of the best known minor league players a half century ago, was a former president of the Western League for 11 years. He was a close friend of the late Charles A. Comiskey, owner of the Chicago White Sox, and served as a scout, bringing to the club several players who developed into stars.

## GREENLEAF AGAIN BILLIARD CHAMP

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 17. —(AP)—Ralph Greenleaf, hardy perennial of pocket billiards, had \$1,500 prize money and his 15th world championship to show today for his playoff victory last night over Irving Crane, 23, of Livonia, N. Y.

The New York City veteran, defending champion, marching roughshod over Crane, ended with his best run of 76. His winning margin was 125 to minus 1 in 11 innings. The runner-up prize netted Crane \$1,100.

Willie Mosconi of Philadelphia, captured third place and a prize of \$900 by defeating Jimmy Caras of Wilmington, Del., 125 to 96, in an accompanying playoff that went 18 innings. Caras' winnings were \$800.

In the title match, it was Greenleaf hands down from the second inning. Crane had a run of 11 at the start of the second but the champion ran on to 17 in his half of the inning and was never beaten from that point.

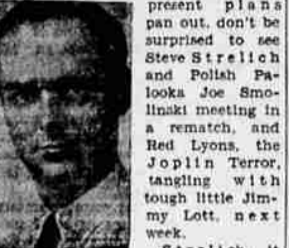
