

STATE MEDICINE URGED BY NURSE FOR MIDDLE CLASS

Something Must Be Done, Is Counsel of Ashland Public Health Worker at Association Meet Here

Jackson County Health association met yesterday afternoon at the court house with Mrs. Bertha L. Denton, public health school nurse of Ashland, giving a talk on pertinent facts studied at the University of Washington summer session this year. Her subject was "What a University Has To Offer a Graduate Nurse."

Mrs. Denton said that something had to be done for the middle classes in regard to medical attention and that the answer to the problem is state medicine. "The very poor are taken care of by various organizations and the rich have the money to pay for care but the vast middle class must either go without proper medical treatment or meet the expense themselves," she said.

She quoted the secretary of the American Medical association as saying that the association should stop fighting state medicine and take the lead in bringing it to the United States. Cites Venereal Spread The speaker also referred at length to venereal diseases, saying she was surprised to learn how they have spread through the United States. Venereal diseases rank first, or nearly first, in the cause of deaths in this country today, she said, attributing this spread to lax conditions in the public schools which could be corrected by sex education if the public would stand for such education. Some progress is being made in this direction however, Mrs. Denton stated, and she expressed the hope that the time would arrive when a course on this subject would be offered along with the rest of the curriculum.

The modern trend in school nursing is to teach the child and parents to do things for themselves rather than have others do things for them, the speaker said. This nurse is an educator and guide, not a mother, she added in explaining the position of a nurse in the school program.

The social security act has allotted \$6,000,000 to states and counties to assist them in maintaining health services and money has also been given for the control of syphilis, Mrs. Denton pointed out. Anyone having this disease should report to his own doctor or a public health department and proper care will be given without charge, she emphasized.

Urges Seal Patronage Mrs. R. E. Green read a message from Miss Mildred Carlton, president of the county association, in which she urged the support for the annual Christmas seal sale drive. Figures were cited showing that there are 800,000 cases of tuberculosis in the United States costing society and industry two billion dollars. This tremendous expenditure is needless, it was stressed, because tuberculosis can be prevented and cured. Jackson county has the lowest death rate from this cause in Oregon, it was brought out.

Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, treasurer of the organization, read a report of the Community Chest drive showing that 97 1/2 percent of the goal had been realized. Mrs. J. H. Fuller, vice president,

presided at the meeting. Tea was served after the program by Central Point members.

Wall St. Report

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Stock market leaders topped in fast dealings today as Wall street sentiment was further clouded by business, labor and political prospects.

Numerous issues went overboard for losses running to 5 points and a few as much as 8 or so. New lows for the past year or longer were plentiful.

Transfers were in the neighborhood of 1,800,000 shares. Exemplifying the downward economic slant was the freight loadings barometer for last week. This revealed a more than seasonal decline with the total around 100,000 cars below the same time last year. Automobile output was up over the preceding week but well down from the 1936 period.

Chilling buying contingents also were "sit-down" strikes at General Motors and Goodyear plants a restraining factor. In addition, was seen in financial forecasts that congress probably would be unable to provide tax relief at the special session, which industrial officials have favored as a recovery need.

U. S. government securities turned strong in the bond department, but corporation loans backed away. Today's closing prices for 32 selected stocks follow:
