NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Further depressing business news swayed the stock market today and at the worst, leading issues fell one to six points generally and as much as nine or so in a few cases. Chilling sentiment was the tenth consecutive week's drop in stock mill operations. For the current week these were placed at 31 per cent of capacity against around 80 per cent when the lengthy recession began in September. The rate was the smallest since December 3, 1934.
