### Typical Thanks Day Menu Is Suggested by Noted Chef

The following article was prepared especially for the Mail Tribune by Hy Frager, Medford chef, who has received national recognition for his unique recipes.

A Thanksgiving festival for blessings received throughout the year is an old-age custom the world over. In our own United States it is of special significance, and is our first national holiday. In 1921 Governor Bradford decreed a community dinner to celebrate the end of months of hardship and want undergone by the Plymouth colony.

That first feast made use of foods native to the new country, yet the menu was very like those served today. Oysters, clams and fish were plentiful, and there was a variety of grains, fruit and vegetables about which the Pilgrims had learned from the Indians. Cornbread, scalloped corn or corn pudding, and Indian meal pudding may have been included in the early New England bill of fare. Wild fowl and game, including the much-prized turkey, were plentiful in the neighboring woods.

It only seems fitting that the typically American holiday feast should feature those foods for which this country is famous, and according to the present trend, more and more homes will do just that this year. Foods found in America are blended with some favorite English dishes, recipes for which were brought by the colonists from their old homes. Of this group the traditional plum pudding is typical.

#### Traditional Plum Pudding

- 1 pound Sultana raisins
- 1 cup currants
- 1/2 cup walnuts
- 1 cup orange peel, shredded
- 1 cup lemon peel, shredded
- 1 cup citron, shredded
- 2 cups fine bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup bread flour
- 1/2 cups suet, finely chopped
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup full bodied rum
- 1 egg
- 1 lemon, juice
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon each nutmeg, allspice and cinnamon

Mix dry ingredients together thoroughly. Add milk and beaten eggs, then rum and lemon juice. Knead mixture till well blended.

Grease liberally with chopped candied ginger. Place mixture in the cloth and tie securely. Drop in boiling water for 4 hours. Prior to serving, remove from cloth, place on serving dish, and pour rum over top liberally. Ignite at the table.

During the holiday season roast turkey is the food around which many menus are planned. I will not repeat the directions for roasting turkey, but I would like to suggest good and unusual turkey stuffings.

#### Pecan Stuffing

- 3 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 cup broken pecan meats
- 1 dry onion
- 1 cup soup stock
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1-8 teaspoon pepper

Cook onion until soft in soup stock. Combine all ingredients and stuff lightly into bird.

#### Ham Stuffing

- 3 cups minced ham
- 2 cups bread crumbs
- 1 cooked onion, minced
- 2 apples, minced
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 2-3 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Combine all ingredients and stuff lightly into bird.

#### Quaker's Chestnut Dressing

- 1 quart chestnuts
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 1/2 cup cream
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon onion juice
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

- Salt chestnuts cross-wise on the flat side and spread in baking pan with a little additional butter. Put in hot oven for about 19 minutes. Cool and remove husks. Then boil in water until soft and force through a potato ricer after straining off water. There should be at least 3 cups. Combine all other ingredients with this chestnut puree and stuff lightly into bird.

#### Cranberry Juice Cocktail

- 1 pound cranberries
- 1 quart cold water
- 1 cup sugar

Bring cranberries to boil in cold water. Remove from heat when they burst. Strain, add sugar and boil again for five minutes. Cool and serve chilled.

#### A Delicious Light Dessert

##### Swiss Fondue

- 3 cups Swiss cheese (chopped)
- 1/2 cup dry Sauterne wine
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- Dash tabasco
- Salt
- 3 egg yolks

Put all ingredients except egg yolks in a saucepan, stir over low heat until cheese is melted and ingredients are blended. Quickly stir in well-beaten egg yolks and serve over crisp slices of toast.

### JUSTICE DENIED TRIAL REHEARING

SALEM, Nov. 23.—(AP)—The state supreme court denied today the petition for a rehearing of Jack Justice, sentenced to life imprisonment for hiring Leo Hall, hanged for the sextuple murders at Erland's Point, near Bremerton, Wash., to murder W. Frank Akin, Port of Portland investigator slain November 20, 1933.

Justice was accused of paying Hall \$1,200 to commit the crime. Hall also was indicted for the Akin murder but was executed for the sextuple murders before he could be tried for killing Akin.

The court upheld Justice's conviction unanimously on September 29. Larry Paulos, husband of Peggy Paulos, who betrayed Hall's sextuple crime to the police, testified at the Akin trial that he assaulted Akin, in behalf of Justice, for a promise of \$200. The Akin defense, in its court appeal contended that this testimony was inadmissible.

### CLACKAMAS OFFICERS ARRESTED IN LARCENY

OREGON CITY, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Sheriff E. T. Mass, Deputy Sheriff Howard Mass, his son, and Jessie Paddock, tax deputy, were free on bail ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,500 today after their arrests yesterday on charges of larceny of county funds.

A Clackamas county grand jury, following a six months' investigation, returned indictments for wrongful possession of county funds as follows: Sheriff Mass, \$1,000 on July 1, 1936; Howard Mass, \$637.06 on May 23, 1935, and \$80 on January 11, 1937; Jessie Paddock, \$360.87 in July 1, 1936.

### PROMINENT ATTORNEY DIES DURING ADDRESS

PORTLAND, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Roscoe C. Nelson, prominent member of the Oregon Bar and former president of the state board of higher education, collapsed and died as he concluded an address before the Town club last night.

Nelson passed his 58th birthday two weeks ago. He had appeared in good health. Death probably was caused by a heart attack.

His wife was also attending the dinner. She rushed to his side with Dr. Eugene Rockey, who was listening to the address, but the lawyer apparently died almost instantly.

### 75th Traffic Death On Portland Record

PORTLAND, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Norman C. Austin, 18, died last night of injuries received when a car he was riding in collided with a streetcar at NE Union avenue and Hancock street.

Two companions, Frank Peterson, 17, and Edwin Carter, 16, were seriously injured.

The accident caused a short circuit which set the streetcar afire and tied up traffic for nearly an hour.

It was the 75th traffic death here for the fiscal year.

### Honor Dead Veteran

PORTLAND, Nov. 23.—(AP)—Donald Dymont, 37, first sergeant of the Oregon national guard, World war veteran and city sanitary inspector, will be buried Wednesday with full military honors. He died Saturday night. Dymont's father, the late Collin V. Dymont, was at one time dean of the University of Oregon.
