600 Bull Elk Shot In Four Counties

PORTLAND, Nov. 23.—(AP)—E. P. Cliff, U. S. forest service official, estimated today that Oregon's elk-hunting sportsmen killed 600 bulls in four counties this year. Last available reports showed that out of 2816 hunters who checked in at 14 eastern Oregon stations, 1654 had checked out, reporting 544 kills, with some 1200 hunters to be heard from last year hunters bagged 547 bulls.

D. CRONEMILLER PASSES IN S. F.

Dave Cronemiller, well known Jackson county man and a former member of the Shrine lodge and American Legion here, died in San Francisco November 10 and was buried at the Presidio. It was revealed today by his uncle, Harry H. Helms of Helms.

Mr. Helms said that his nephew had been discovered sitting at his table in his residence at 936 Eddy street, death apparently coming from a heart attack. He was 48 years old.

He was born in Jacksonville and attended high school there, later studying at the University of Oregon. He was a deputy sheriff in the county under Ralph Jennings and also practiced accountancy during his many years in Medford and vicinity.

His father, James M. Cronemiller, former county treasurer, died in 1923. His mother, Elizabeth Cronemiller, died three years ago, and soon afterward Dave Cronemiller went to San Francisco where he obtained employment in Berkeley.

He is survived by his uncle and two aunts, Mrs. Richard Bland of Portland and Mrs. Mamie Cronemiller of Brea, Cal.

U. S. AMBASSADOR LEAVES NANKING AS JAPS ADVANCE

Temporary Embassy Established at Hankow—Gunboat Steams to Aid Americans at Up-River Points

SHANGHAI, Nov. 23.—(AP)—United States Ambassador Nelson T. Johnson and members of his staff embarked today on the United States gunboat Luzon for the long Yangtze river trip from Nanking to Hankow where a temporary embassy has been established.

Hankow, in Hupeh province, one of the three cities to which the central Chinese government had moved under the threat of an advancing Japanese army, lies about 280 miles by air southwest of Nanking and considerably further by way of the winding Yangtze.

Aides at Nanking Johnson left aides at Nanking, including second Secretaries George Acheson, Jr., and J. Hall Paxton and assistant military attaché Frank Roberts and assistant naval attaché James McHugh.

While the American ambassador followed the Nanking government on its withdrawal further into the interior, another United States gunboat, the Oahu, steamed to the assistance of Americans at Wuhu, Kiukiang and other Yangtze ports upriver from Nanking.

A third gunboat, the Panay, was under orders to remain at Nanking.

The German, British, French, Russian, Italian, Belgian and Mexican representatives also moved to Hankow. Envoys of the Netherlands and Switzerland preceded it; Shanghai Japs Hammer Wash.

These evacuations left 42 foreigners in Nanking—34 Americans, 10 British, 11 Germans and one Austrian.

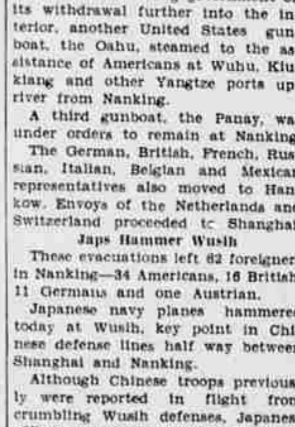
Japanese navy planes hammered today at Wuhu, key point in Chinese defense lines half way between Shanghai and Nanking.

Although Chinese troops previously were reported in flight from crumbling Wushih defenses, Japanese officers admitted Chinese still held the city, some 95 miles southeast of the nation's capital. Japanese seemed confident their troops could reach Nanking this week.

At mid-day, Japanese said their forces still were five miles east of Wushih. Roads to the front were almost impassable because of continued heavy rains, so Japanese used airplanes to transport food and supplies to troops in the Wushih sector.
