All commended the entire squad for their excellent performances during the year, substitutes as well as regulars, and painted a picture of the future when many of this year's junior high segregation would be carrying the colors of the high school Black Tornado into action.

Coach Harrington paid special tribute to those youngsters who, not members of the first team and seeing little action, nevertheless did their duty and helped immeasurably by turning out the entire season and

LIGHT TROUBLES BRING \$10 FINE

California Salad
Wafers Cheese
Cider Fruit Punch
Sour Cream Doughnuts

California Salad
1 cup cooked sagaragus.
1 cup cooked, sliced carrots.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon chopped onions.
1 tablespoon chopped parsley.
Mix ingredients. Chill. Serve on shredded lettuce. Top with dressing.

Dressing
1/2 cup mayonnaise.
2 tablespoons chopped olives.
2 tablespoons chili sauce.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice.
Mix ingredients. Chill and serve.

Sour Cream Doughnuts
3 eggs, beaten.
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar.
1 1/2 cups sour cream.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon.
5/8 cups flour.
1 teaspoon baking powder.
1 1/2 teaspoons soda.

Beat eggs and add sugar. Add cream. Beat 2 minutes. Add rest of the ingredients and mix lightly. If the dough is too sticky to handle easily, add a little more flour. Chill dough. Divide it into halves and roll out each half on a floured board. When dough is one-third of an inch thick, cut out doughnuts and fry

until brown in deep hot fat.
Cider Fruit Punch
1/2 cup granulated sugar.
2-3 cup pineapple juice.
1 cup orange juice.
1/4 cup lemon juice.
4 cups cider.
Boil sugar and juices together for two minutes. Cool. Add cider and chill.

DEFENSE HEARD IN BURKHARDT CASE \$1100 RAISED FOR CHURCH BUILDING

The defense in the damage suit of B. F. Burkhardt against Jay R. Williams, Nettie C. Williams, Bert Williams, Opal Nelson and Lois Pretwell, opened this morning in circuit court. Burkhardt alleges the defendants entered into a conspiracy to have him committed to the insane asylum, by the filing of an insanity complaint. Burkhardt seeks \$5000 punitive, and \$5100 general damages from each of the defendants. The insanity complaint was dismissed.

Defense witnesses on the stand declared they signed the insanity complaint because of the alleged threats and actions of the plaintiff, and were actuated by no malice. They alleged Burkhardt once declared the then district attorney of Jackson county, "should be hung with barbed wire around his neck, and shot with a 30-30 rifle."

The defense is represented by Attorney Charles W. Reames, and the plaintiff by Attorney Gus Newbury. Counsel indulged in a number of sharp interchanges.

The case is expected to go to the jury early tomorrow.
