60 DAYS, \$100 FINE FOR DRUNK DRIVER

Byron G. Works pled guilty to driving an auto while under the influence of intoxicating liquor and was sentenced this morning to serve 60 days in the county jail and pay a fine of \$100, by Justice of the Peace William R. Coleman. The records revealed it was Works' second conviction on the same offense and his driver's license had not been restored.

Testimony introduced showed Works had been arrested on the Pacific highway in Talent November 22 when erratic driving was noted by a state trooper. Works was taken to Ashland and placed in the city jail there. Later he developed abdominal pains and a doctor was called who advised Works be taken to a hospital. Works died when opportunity offered and was re-capitulated last night walking north on the railroad track.

F. M. Smith, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, waived a preliminary hearing and was ordered held to the grand jury under \$1000 bond. Smith allegedly passed a \$10 spurious check upon Victor L. Marshall who signed the complaint. Smith was arrested in Portland and returned here.
