WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today he wanted tax revision as soon as congress is ready to go ahead with it. As further moves to restore confidence and stimulate industry the president told his press conference he would send a message to congress Monday recommending legislation to spur private financing of a large scale housing program and another Tuesday proposing curtailment in the annual appropriations for federal aid in road building.



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TOKYO, Nov. 26. (AP)—The Tokyo newspaper Hochi today published a dispatch from Tsuanga, asserting that 1,500 Soviet airplanes had been massed in the maritime provinces, that part of Siberia nearest Japan. The same source reported 1,000 Russian bombing planes were entering China by way of Sianfu, capital of Western Shensi province, presumably to buttress China's resistance to Japan.

TURKEY GROWERS CALLED TO TALK UNION ULTIMATUM
Turkey growers of Jackson county, numbering close to 200, will meet Saturday at 1:30 p. m. in the court house auditorium to discuss threatened union labor restrictions against turkeys shipped from this section unless they bear a union label.

PORTLAND HOPEFUL
In Portland, state, city and civic leaders, determined to end a 104-day-old deadlock in the sawmill industry, will assemble Monday with Charles W. Hope, regional director of the national labor relations board, Gov. Martin and Mayor Joseph Carson, of Portland, served notice on the board to provide some immediate solution "or get out of the picture."



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AT DAWN, the first motorcade of 30 automobiles approached the main gate, where a police detail watched milling pickets closely. A few stones were thrown. An hour and a half later, a crowd made by an Associated Press staff member and four other newsmen showed 474 workers had entered the plant in 137 automobiles. The count showed 353 of the men drove into the grounds in the first hour.

Therefore, three things stick out of the real story of the conference like so many sore thumbs. 1. The president made no peace offer to the utilities executives. 2. A peace program was brought down by at least one of the utilities executives, Wendell L. Wilkie, of the Commonwealth and Southern company. And although the Wilkie program involved such concessions as a general write-off of \$14,000,000 in the national utilities capitalization, and future acceptance of the president's "prudent investment" theory of rate-making, the president seemed to pay little or no attention to it.

BURKHARDT LOSES IN DAMAGE ACTION
A verdict in favor of the defendants was returned Wednesday night by a circuit court jury in the damage suit of B. F. Burkhardt against Jay R. Williams, Nettie C. Williams, Ber. Williams, Dale Stokes, Opal Nelson and Lois Pretwell. Burkhardt sought \$5,000 punitive and \$5,100 general damages from each of the defendants on the allegation they had entered into a conspiracy to send him to the insane asylum when they signed a complaint last April.

SEAL SALE DRIVE OPENS TODAY IN JACKSON COUNTY

ARREST MACHADO ON CUBAN CHARGE
NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Gerardo Machado, former president of Cuba, was arrested today at the Murray Hill hospital by the U. S. marshal's office, his counsel, Francis A. O'Neill, announced. He was arrested on an extradition request by the Cuban government, which charged him with murder, embezzlement and various other crimes.

COASTAL HIGHWAY OPEN TO TRAFFIC
SALISBURY, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The Oregon coast highway was open today, although water and slides hindered traffic at several points. Cars were going over the flooded section west of Coquille behind a pilot car, while one-way traffic was effective at Depoe bay, near Wheeler, south of Coquille and north of the Coos Bay bridge.

SEAMEN RESCUED OFF HAITI SHORE
MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Tropical radio was advised today the 17 seamen remaining aboard the British freighter Nollington Court in distress off Haiti had been rescued but that the vessel was a total loss. A message from the Tug Killereg said: "Tug Killereg took remaining 17 crew from Nollington Court. Nollington Court is a total loss. All lives saved."

NOVICE BANDITS BEATEN, HELD BY S. P. TRAIN CREW

Walker's original appointment to the transit commission as assistant counsel. The salary is \$12,000, and Walker's appointment would have made him eligible for a pension.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The moving mountain moved enough today to break a water main, which flooded to ankle-depth streets in the immediate vicinity. At noon city engineers began repairing the main, which is directly at the base of the big cliff.
