

DETROIT REDUCES CHILD FATALITIES THROUGH SCHOOLS

Special Courses Are Given to Cut Pedestrian Accidents and Train Future Drivers of Automobiles

DETROIT, Nov. 26.—(UP)—Fifty thousand Detroit school children are enrolled in traffic courses said to represent the most advanced effort ever made to reduce the motor car's toll of death and injury.

They are in the front ranks in a concerted drive for traffic safety carried on by the schools, the police department, the courts and automobile manufacturers.

The school program, which only last year was extended to the intermediate and high schools, has a double aim—to teach the pedestrian safe habits and to impress future motorists with the need for care and consideration in driving.

Required study.

Since its inauguration last year in the upper grades, every high school student must have credit for a one-semester course in traffic safety before he can be graduated.

Eventually, actual driving instruction probably will be offered. So far this work is in the experimental stage, with "driving clubs" organized in three of the high schools.

Warren E. Bow, assistant superintendent of schools and more or less godfather of the traffic safety program, greeted us in his far from official office the other afternoon and explained obligingly.

Child Fatalities Cut.

Bow called attention to the fact that traffic safety courses have been included in elementary school curricula since 1919. This work later was supplemented by organization of the schoolboy safety patrol, a system now used by almost every major city in the nation. In this connection, Bow supplied this startling fact:

"When the safety patrol was organized," he said, "40 percent of accident fatalities were among children of school age, or under 15. Now only 8 percent are in this group."

How much the educational program itself had to do with this remarkable reduction in accidents among school children cannot be estimated. But Bow also has figures showing the improvement in traffic knowledge on the part of high school students since the new system took effect.

Law Knowledge Gained.

These figures show that students' knowledge of traffic laws and the principles of traffic safety increased from 50 to 75 percent after completing the regular one-semester course required for graduation. On the basis of these statistics, officials believe they have sound basis for the belief that, over a period of years, their program will contribute materially to the reduction of accidents.

Under the system now in effect, traffic courses are offered in three grades—the eighth, tenth and twelfth. The first and last of these are under direction of the social science department, while the tenth grade courses are taught through the health education department. Three hundred teachers are assigned to this work, specially trained through the city's municipal university.

SEATTLE, Nov. 26.—(AP)—The Washington and Oregon state bar associations have joined forces to present

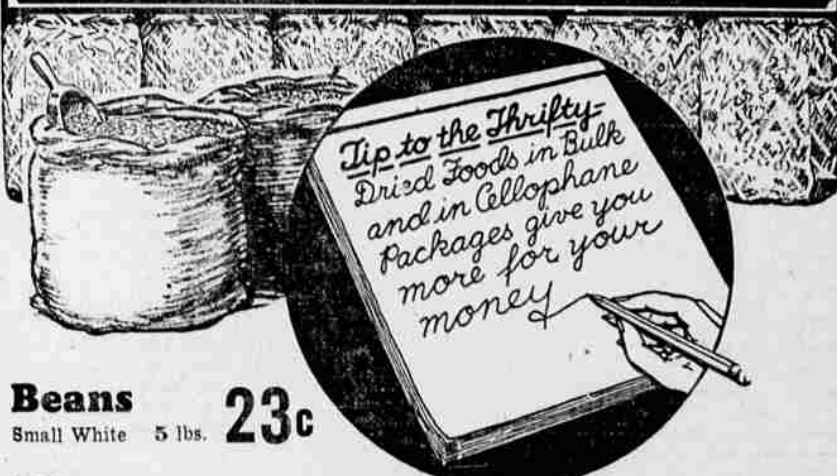
an educational campaign through newspapers and radio. A dramatic series entitled "Law Theater" will be released by the boards of governors of the associations.
