SERENO HOLDEN, PIONEER, PASSES

Sereno Holden, 82, a resident of Jackson county for the past 53 years, passed away at Lake Creek where he had been making his home for the last year with Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Fox.

Mr. Holden was born in Branch county, Mich., in 1855. When a small child his parents moved to Iowa and at the age of nine years he was taken by them to Kansas where he grew to manhood and came with his parents to Jackson county, Ore., in 1884, residing here since that time, most of which was spent at Ashland and Talent.

In coming to Oregon the family left the train at Redding which was then the end of the railroad and came to the Rogue River valley by stage. He leaves no relatives. Funeral services will be held at 1:30 Saturday, Conger funeral parlors in charge.

NAZI JEW OUSTER HITS 3000 MARK

BERLIN, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Three thousand Jews have been ousted from the German theater, motion pictures and newspapers since 1933, Propaganda Minister Joseph Goebbels announced today at the annual meeting of the Reich culture chamber of the strength through joy organization.

Chancellor Hitler attended the meeting. Goebbels announced also that a pension scheme for theatrical em-ployees will be put into operation January 1. The trade union commissioner, Robert Ley, disclosed that 600,000,000 marks (about \$240,000,000) had been spent to date on "beautifying labor."

Of this sum, Ley said, one-third had been spent in improving the crew quarters on 324 ships. He said more vessels were under construction, two now in the Danzig yards, to carry workers on vacation cruises which will be extended next year to American resorts.

Hunter Wounded. NEWPORT, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Frank V. Fogarty, 18, an assistant airway observer here, spent Thanksgiving Day in a hospital. Duck hunting at South Beach, his gun accidentally discharged, the shot tearing the flesh off his left forearm.

ROSS KIDNAP SEARCH IS SPURRED AS SIXTH RANSOM BILL APPEARS

CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Discovery that a \$10 bill passed recently in northern Illinois was part of the \$50,000 ransom paid in vain for the return of Charles S. Ross, gave fresh impetus today to the search for the abductors of the 72-year-old retired Chicago manufacturer.

It was the sixth ransom bill to make its appearance since the kidnaping two months ago. The others were uncovered in two loop stores and in the vicinity of the far south side of the city.

Mrs. Mabel C. Cook of Union, Ill., reported she received the bill a week ago and was attracted by the penciled numbers, 107,686, on the bottom of the margin. She copied the serial numbers before spending the note in payment of a coal bill.

D. M. Ladd, head of the Chicago office of the bureau of investigation declined comment on the latest clue except to say the penciled numbers were "very important."

Ross was kidnaped September 25 on a highway 15 miles west of Chicago while returning from a dinner engagement at Sycamore, Ill., with his former secretary, Miss Florence Freilage.

Nazarene Church To Open Special Campaign Sunday On Sunday morning, the Church of the Nazarene will open a campaign in a special evangelism effort. The series will continue every evening excepting Saturday until Sunday, December 12.

The Rev. Lon B. Woodrum of Okla-homa City, Okla., is the evangelist engaged for the two weeks. He has just concluded meetings in San Francisco and Sacramento. A report from the San Francisco series stated that it was one of the best in the history of the church there.

The evangelist is called the "Edgar Guest of the Gospel," from the fact that he is considered a gifted poet. This talent, woven into his gospel messages, adds much interest and charm to his presentations. Mr. Woodrum having the faculty of an mixing wit, satire and solemnity as an orator, said the Rev. Fred Weatherford, pastor.

Mr. Weatherford stated "we are happy to present to the public such a gifted genius." The musical department will be assisted by Mrs. Lorena Robinson, soloist, and the Rev. R. E. Griffith, as directing chorister.

Battery Plant Burns. LOS ANGELES, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Fire swept a battery plant in the heart of the southwest industrial district here early today, causing damage estimated at nearly \$200,000. Four fire companies, endangered by bursting bottles of acid, halted the flames after they raged through a brick building occupying half a city block.

Park Sets Record. DENVER—(UP)—David R. Cauden, superintendent of Rocky Mountain national park, north of here, announced that 651,899 persons visited the park during the year ending Sept. 30. This was the greatest number of visitors in the history of the resort, showing an 184 per cent increase over last year.

The greatest percentage increase in the population of the United States occurred between 1890 and 1910 when there was a gain of 36.4 percent.

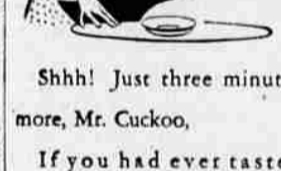

PLANE FORCED DOWN IN ELK CREEK AREA. PASSENGERS UNHURT

An Arrow-Sport airplane, with two male passengers aboard, on route from San Francisco to Portland, was forced down Thursday afternoon in the Elk Creek district about 30 miles from this city. The plane escaped damage and the passengers were un-hurt.

Department of commerce aides and the state police reported they did not know the names of the air travelers except that both were from San Francisco and one was named "Peacock." Airport officials said they had received no report or details of the mishap.

State police reported they received a telephone call Thursday afternoon stating a plane had been flying over the Christie ranch for half an hour and was "lost and looking for a landing place." A state trooper was dispatched. In the meantime the plane landed in a pasture safely.

Airport attaches said the two pas-sengers obtained gasoline, and sur-mised they intended to continue their flight. The plane landed in rough coun-try. A high fog and mist prevailed.

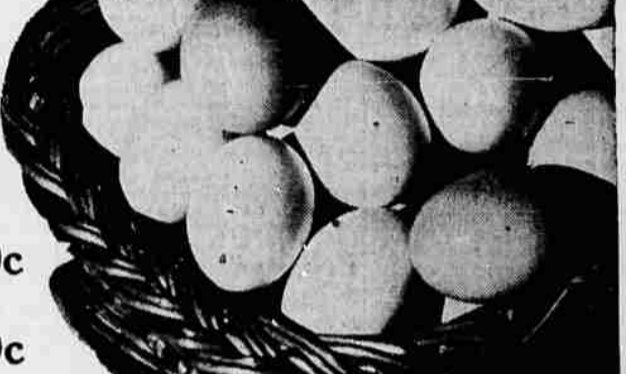
