

# Oregon Defeats San Deigo Marines 24-7 in Viciously Waged Battle

## BREID, HALFBACK NICHOLSON, HELD NAVAL HOSPITAL

First Half Scores Bring Victory To Callison Squad—Graybeal Stars.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Oregon university's Webfoot rolled up a comfortable first-half lead and then were hard pressed to protect their advantage in the last two quarters as they defeated the San Diego Marines, 24 to 7, before 8000 here today.

The Pacific coast conference outfit scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second and once in the third, while the Marines made their lone tally in the final session and threatened on two other occasions during the last half. The Devil Dogs put on a spectacular aerial circus in the fourth quarter and had the Webfoot on the run through most of the period.

Little Jay Graybeal, Oregon's great open-field runner, accounted for the initial tally, just before the end of the opening quarter, when he started off right tackle, put on a burst of speed and scored without having been touched. Recovery of a Marine fumble on the Devil Dogs' 14-yard line in the second quarter paved the way for another Oregon touchdown once more it was Graybeal who rang the bell. This time he reached the dirt on a 10-yard sprint around left end.

The Webfoot took the air for their next score, a long pass, Steve Anderson to Dale Lasselle, being completed in the end zone after a 39-yard throw.

Soon after the third quarter got under way, Oregon punctured the Marine defense with another touchdown pass. Southpaw Bob Smith culminated a 50-yard march by flipping a short pass to Anderson in the end zone. Anderson, Huston and Lasselle all tried their luck at conversions from placement, and all failed.

Late in the third quarter the Marines tossed aside their running plays and relied almost completely on an aerial offense. From their own 37-yard line Callison completed a series of short throws to Don Gibson and Ennis. A pass from the Oregon six-yard line was completed to Gibson for the Marines' only touchdown and Ross Rountree converted with a placekick.

During their second drive, the Marines completed five passes in a row and the entire game their average was 11 out of 19. It was in only this department and punting that the service men excelled.

The game, viciously fought, produced three injuries of a serious nature. Denny Breid, center of Oregon, suffered contusions of the head and spine; Jimmy Nicholson, New York fullback, incurred a broken shoulder, and Bob Huth, Marine guard, wound up with contusions of the hip. All were confined in the naval hospital here.

## COLUMBIA HOLDS STANFORD TO TIE, HOOVER ATTENDS

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Columbia, dormat of the Ivy league, finished its season with a rousing hurrah by battling the Stanford Indians to a scoreless tie before 20,000 rain-soaked fans at Baker field today.

Not only did Sid Luckman and his valiant comrades avert the expected rout, but they actually outplayed the huskies from the coast most of the afternoon. They missed a touchdown by only two yards in the closing period and twice before nudged their way inside Stanford's 20-yard line.

Stanford threatened only once, in the final minutes they punted the ball 68 yards right down the middle, only to be brought up short 12 yards from the goal. Bill Luckett rushed in and tied a placement kick from the 25, but it went wide. Stanford's "Columbia" jinx held good to the last.

As a matter of fact, the jinx consisted principally of Luckman. He gave the coast team and its followers, including former President Herbert Hoover, an eyeful of football players. The big fellow passed and ran and kicked the Stanford's right back on their heels. Only Pete Fay, the Indians' scurrying halfback, gave him a slight argument for the day's honors.

## 102,000 SEE ARMY BEAT NAVY 6 TO 0 IN HECTIC GAME

MUNICIPAL STADIUM, PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Army's Cadets executed an early passing attack with a slipper ball, scored a first period touchdown and then stood off Navy's spirited second half rallies to whip the sailors 6 to 0 today in the 38th renewal of their series before the year's biggest football crowd, 102,000.

Shifting suddenly from a running attack midway of the first period, while a steady rain pelted down, the cadets struck quickly and built their winning touchdown on a pair of long tows, with Jim Craig bucking the final two yards through the sailor forewall. John Ryan's placement try for the extra point was wide.

Starting from Navy's 44 after a couple of rushes, Woody Wilson shot a pass to Jim Schwenk, big fullback, for a 20-yard gain, and then Long southpawed a 17-yard toss to Jack Ryan, who caught the ball and tumbled out of bounds on the two. Shackled deep in its own territory during the first two periods, due chiefly to a pair of poor kicks by Lemuel Cooke at the outset, Navy took a fresh start at the beginning of the third period and rushed the Army's five-man line off its feet on a 49-yard drive that carried to Army's 16 and wound up inches of a fourth consecutive first down.

Navy made one more bid, with Cooke leading a charge down to Army's 32, but Jim Craig's lengthy kicks steadily began to push Navy further and further back and, in the end, Navy could do little but gamble unsuccessfully on a desperate air attack.
