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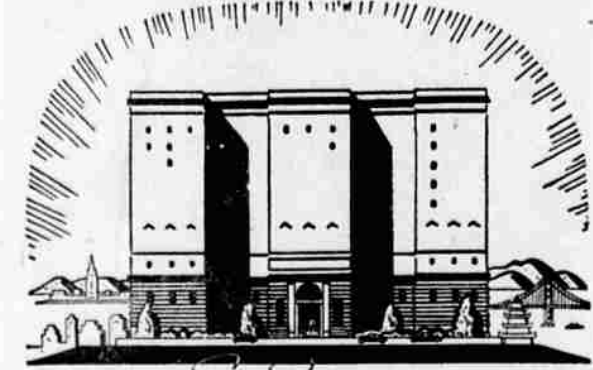

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**WILKINS SERVES JAIL SENTENCE**  
M. O. Wilkins, attorney, sentenced to serve three months in the county jail for driving an auto while intoxicated, was freed over the weekend, the sheriff's office reports. Wilkins served 43 days. The sheriff said Wilkins would return to Chiloquin, his former home.

Wilkins entered a plea of guilty in circuit court, and sentence was passed by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton. He was indicted by the grand jury.

On the night of September 18, it was charged, Wilkins drove his auto to a service station at Gold Hill, striking two gasoline pumps, and then drove away. In the Gold Hill police court, he was found guilty by a jury of failure to stop at the scene of an accident. He was fined \$50 and half the fine was remitted when Wilkins paid for the pump repairs.

**FOUR IN FRONT SEAT BRING FINE OF \$7.50**  
Benjamin B. Anderson, 20, of Ashland, charged with permitting four adult persons to ride in the front seat of an auto, was fined \$7.50 and costs in justice court yesterday.

Anderson's employer appeared in court for him. The fine was increased because state police testified Anderson had been given a previous warning for the same offense.

Charles H. Swift, Medford, was fined \$25 and costs for trapping fur animals out of season. The fine was paid, and further time granted for payment of costs. The case has been held in abeyance for several days while the court awaited a game commission ruling.

**STUART OFFICE AGAIN ENTERED BY THIEVES**  
Burglars struck the office of R. I. Stuart and Sons, concrete contractors Sunday night, for the second time within the past week, obtaining 50 cents in stamps, Gilbert Stuart told city police yesterday.

The office was entered by breaking and removing a window, police said. Loot obtained by the robbers consisted only of the stamps, Stuart reported, nothing else being disturbed or missing.

The office was also broken into the night of November 25, when a handful of 38-caliber rifle shells and a bunch of keys were stolen.

Police believe both robberies were the action of transients.

## Ermine, Emeralds Parade At Metropolitan Opening

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—(AP) Opera was in full swing again today at the Metropolitan opera house after the most plush opening night since 1929.

The Astors, the Vanderbilts, the Belmonts and other bulwarks of New York society were represented last night in the audience of 4,000 that heard Wagner's "Tristan and Isolde"—along with the president's mother, an ambassador's wife, a U. S. senator and Libby Holman (minus her stockings).

If yards of ermine, large emeralds, dazzling diamond necklaces and silver-cretes are any gauge of business conditions, the opera opening proved something.

There was an abundance of riches in attire.

In contrast to the year when Ganna Walska's ropes of emeralds were the only ones at the opera, there was a double rope of them on Mrs. Christian Holmes, a two-inch emerald adorning Mrs. Clarence Mackay, the former Anna Case of the "Met," and an emerald tiara or two in addition.

One pair of tickets sold for \$150. More than 500 opera fans waited in line to pay \$2 for standing room; 100 were in the 41 stanchion line—and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt had two boxes instead of her usual one.

"Tristan" with Kirsten Flagstad and Lauris Melchior in the leading roles proved a good choice for the opener, contrary to the expectation of "Aida" fans.

Although the inevitable late comers were late as usual—two women with tall black feathers on their heads rustled down the aisle in the middle of the second act—the house in general had an atmosphere of reverence.

Hundreds of stanchions stood four hours and a half, through the last notes of Liebestod, and lingered for the cheers, bravos and bows before the big gold curtains.

The only mishap during the opera—the "sky" awayed a little in the second act.

Mrs. Joseph Davies, the former Marjorie Post Hutton, wife of the U. S. ambassador to Russia, was the star of the parterre boxes. She wore a magnificent ermine and white swirled fox wrap, a tiara of tiny white flowers, a diamond and amethyst necklace and bracelets, and a form-fitting gown of blue and white paillettes.

Senator and Mrs. Millard Tydings of Maryland were in her party.

A gold "ducing cap"—some called it a pagoda—adorned the head of Elsa Schiaparelli, the Paris designer. Another woman roamed the foyer clad in Greek robes of ice blue, with a headdress that seemed a cross be-
