**Bear Season Ends**—Open bear season for Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties ended yesterday. Several bears were shot and trapped during the open season in the Applegate and Lake of the Woods area.

**Active Visitors**—Ken Anderson of Oakland, Cal., and Monte Routledge of Merrill, both former Medford residents and members of the local Active club, were visitors last night at the weekly dinner-meeting of the chapter in the Hotel Medford. The meeting was devoted to business.

**Visiting in Ashland**—Gordon MacCracken, former secretary of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce, who is residing now in Portland, has been spending the past few days visiting friends and relatives in Ashland and Medford. He plans to return to Portland tomorrow morning.

**To Vacation**—Elmer L. Clow, Jackson county jailer, will leave tomorrow on a ten-day vacation which he plans to spend at his gold mine in the Humboldt area. His place as jailer will be filled during his absence by Charles P. Champlin, Jr., special deputy sheriff.

**Skating Still Poor**—With no fresh snow since formation of rainfall last Wednesday, skating conditions continue poor in Crater Lake national park. It was stated in this morning's daily broadcast. All park roads are open and there has been no change in general conditions from those existing over the week-end, park rangers reported.

**Tribal to Meet**—Klamath Indian tribe will hold a general council meeting in the council house on the Klamath agency Monday, December 6 at 10 a. m. Several business matters affecting the tribe are to be decided. As a quorum constitutes not less than 100, all tribal adults eligible to vote are requested by R. C. Courtright, agency superintendent, to be present. Lunch is to be served at noon.

**Grange Meet Off**—Regular December 2 business meeting of the Talent Grange will be omitted because of the bazaar and turkey dinner scheduled by the organization for the same day. It was announced this morning. The bazaar will be held in the Talent Grange hall from 2 to 6 tomorrow afternoon. The turkey dinner will be held in the same place from 6 to 8. After the dinner a dance will be held. The public is invited to all three events.

**Small Blaze**—Negligible damage was done by fire this morning at the residence being built on West Main street near Peach street by Oris Crawford, assistant manager of the First National bank. **Forest Conditions**—Weather conditions on the Rogue River national forest were described by Medford headquarters this morning as follows: Temperature at Lake of the Woods at 8 a. m. was 30 degrees. The south end of the lake was freezing and, if the present weather continues, there should be skating in about a week or ten days. The Dead Indian road to the lake is closed because of logging operations, but the Butte Falls and Klamath Falls roads are open and in good condition. Several parties enjoyed Sunday at their lake cabins. Weather was favorable in the Applegate district but snow blocked the Sixkayu loop drive, 15 miles above the Star ranger station. It was clear in the Union Creek area. No snow having yet fallen. Snow on the Crater Lake highway is not encountered until five miles above Union Creek.

The arch-enemies also met in April at a capital-labor conference called by Secretary Perkins. Participants said they shook hands but did not converse.

Contrary to the belief of many, Lewis and Green have been at odds ever since Lewis took office in the United Mine Workers 20 years ago. Green at the time was secretary of the union.

In the union view, however, they apparently were good personal friends until they started calling each other names during the AFL-CIO dispute.
