

# Five Golden Bears Named on All-Coast Eleven in A. P. Balloting

## JOE GRAY GIVEN WIDE MARGIN AS HALFBACK STAR

Two Huskies Make Charmed Circle — Karamatic Is Choice for Fullback — Wendlick on Second Team

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Associated Press' 1937 All-Pacific coast football team, a mythical eleven chosen in a consensus vote of western coaches, sports writers and officials, includes five University of California players, Pacific coast champions and western representatives in the Rose Bowl.

Two positions on the 13th annual team, released today, went to University of Washington, which held the Golden Bears to a scoreless tie, Stanford, Santa Clara, Gonzaga and Oregon State each placed one player.

Have Speed, Power The AP eleven, based on performance throughout the season, averages 200 pounds in the line and 193 1/2 in the backfield. It has speed, defense, offensive punch on the ground and in the air, blocking and tackling—in fact, about all a coach could ask for.

Bob Herwig, husky California center, and George Karamatic, fleet Gonzaga fullback, retained their 1936 positions. Herwig won easily over Phil Dougherty, Santa Clara, and Karamatic received nearly twice as many votes as Dave Anderson, California, who placed with Dougherty on the second team.

Gray Well Liked One halfback position went to Sam Chapman in the most one-sided vote of the poll, and Joe Gray of Oregon State won the other by a wide margin. John Meek, barrel-chested California quarterback, won his position easily.

(Continued from Page One.) nounced FehI declined to submit to observations by Dr. Steiner. The alienist remained in the courtroom.

Deputy District Attorney George W. Neilson, who held that position during a series of criminal actions that arose out of the Jackson county turmoil, which was climaxed by ballot theft and murder, gave testimony concerning the asserted actions, accusations and attitudes of FehI during that period.

A pamphlet entitled "Black Political Plot Exposed," purportedly written by FehI, while a state prison inmate, along with civil actions and statements by FehI since were introduced, and read to the jury Wednesday afternoon.

The physician's certificate filed by three Portland alienists, following an examination of FehI, in the county jail, in which it was alleged FehI "is insane and suffering from paranoia, and in need of institutional care for the protection of himself, as well as for the protection of others," was also presented.

The sheriff reported that subpoenas had been issued for more than 50 witnesses.

Scheduled to be called to the stand today were the deputy warden, the chaplain, and two guards of the state penitentiary at Salem.
