To Donate Toys—All members of the Eagles lodge and auxiliary were reminded today by Fred Powell, acting president, that tonight's meeting has been set aside to receive old and discarded toys. The playthings will be sent to fire headquarters where they will be rebuilt and repainted by the firemen for distribution among poor children as Christmas presents. Any kind of old toy acceptable, Mr. Powell pointed out. He recalled that last year lodge and auxiliary members brought so many discarded playthings that a truck was required to transport them to fire headquarters. Against Forest Change—Senator Frederick Steiwer is opposed to any organizational change in the United States forest service, he indicated in a telegram to the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce today. The chamber's board of directors recently voted unanimously to oppose the change whereby the forest service, under a pending department reorganization bill, would be removed from the department of agriculture and placed under a new department directed by the board of conservation. The board directed that letters be sent to the Oregon congressional delegation, asking their opposition to any forest service organizational alteration. In his telegram Senator Steiwer said he would give careful consideration to the reorganization bill when it reached the senate and added he was opposed to it in its present form.

Plot Charged—At a mass meeting called as an outgrowth of the slaying of Corcoran, George Cole, regional director of the Committee for Industrial Organization, read an affidavit signed by Robert John Bell, former Minneapolis union man, detailing the alleged plot. Bell is now reported to be on the west coast.

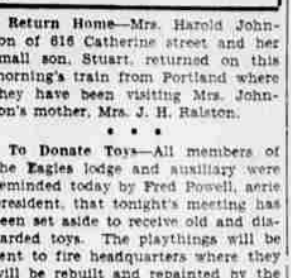
Bell's affidavit said he was called into the office of a Minneapolis APL worker and given \$1,000 with instructions to go to Seattle, but did not know why he was being sent.

Arriving there, he received \$10 a day for expenses, the affidavit said, and after several days was sent to Portland, where another APL leader gave him instructions.

The instructions, Bell said in his affidavit, were to "get" a CIO leader named Harry Bridges. Bell said the labor leader showed him a revolver which the Minneapolis man was to use to kill the opposition union man.

Saying he "loved freedom, and was going to stay free," Bell refused to have anything to do with the scheme, he declared. Later he informed CIO workers of the proposal, he said, and warned them to have Bridges guarded. The death orders, his affidavit said, came from a leader in a teamster's union.
