## FRIENDS TESTIFY EARL FEHL SANE, IN THEIR OPINION

stressed the view that a person might be rational on all subjects save the one that obsessed his mind.

Among those called to the stand were Frank P. Farrell, city attorney; George T. Frey, banker, and E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of city schools. These three testified they were not qualified to give an opinion. All said they had known Fehl for a number of years.

Others called were Arthur T. Bowley, Amos W. Walker, C. T. Whitman, Clayman Charley of Brownsboro, Jack Enright and Joe T. Gagnon. They testified they had noted nothing unusual in the demeanor of Fehl in their contacts with him. Most of these testified they had not read the "Black Political Plot" pamphlet. Those who had, for the most part, admitted under questioning that the pamphlet was not "rational."

Sheriff Syd I. Brown and Justice of the Peace W. R. Coleman, were among witnesses scheduled to be called.

During the morning recess Fehl introduced himself to Dr. R. Lee Steiner, noted alienist and former superintendent of the Oregon State hospital at Salem and held a brief conversation. At Thursday's proceeding, Fehl declined to submit to an examination by Dr. Steiner. Later it was stipulated Dr. Steiner would observe Fehl while he was testifying and afterwards testify to his observations. Dr. Steiner sat at the counsel table.

Fehl is expected to take the stand late this afternoon. There is a prospect the case will be concluded by tomorrow evening.

SEATTLE, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Oregon will top northern division Pacific coast conference basketball play this winter, holding a slight edge over Washington State college, Coach Hec Edmundson of the University of Washington predicted today.

He foresaw the most serious threat in a decade from Idaho, and paired Oregon State with the Vandals. His own club, he said, would "make just as much trouble for our opponents as possible."

## Exiled Tibet Lama Succumbs in China

LONDON, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The Reuters (British) news agency reported today that the Panchen Lama, ranking spiritual ruler of Tibet, had died in western China after 13 years of exile from his so-called "forbidden land."

The dispatch, from New Delhi, India, said the 84-year-old Lama died Tuesday at the town of Jyekundo. He fled in 1924 from the mysterious plateau land after differences with his secular superior, the Dalai Lama, who died in December, 1933.
