Medford Couple Married Friday

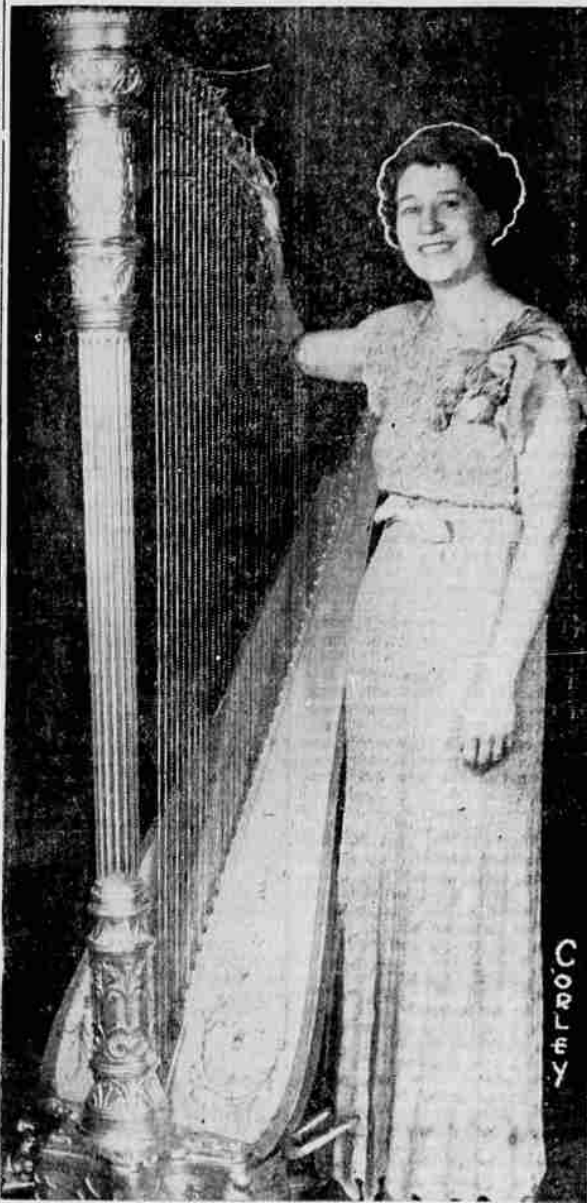

Thursday morning State Regent Mrs. B. G. Harding spoke before the Senior high school assembly concerning the D.A.R. good citizenship pilgrimage. All senior girls in all four year high schools in the state are the seniors with the highest rating in the state will be given a free trip to Washington, D. C., next April. Three girls are selected by the faculty in each school. The student body then votes on the three names. A state judging committee then decides which senior in the state is entitled to this trip.
