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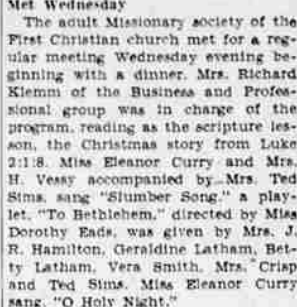
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Wins Divorce

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CENTRAL POINTER GAINS RARE CURE

Alvin F. Greb of Central Point had streptococcus viridans and recovered. Recovery from the infection is rare.

Mr. Greb, a native of Eagle Point who moved to Central Point several months ago, told the Mail Tribune that he was stricken early in October while he was in Chelan, Wash. The infection, he said, centered around his knee and the attending physician thought it might have resulted from a scratch or bruise. The doctor said he had encountered only one other case of the disease. Mr. Greb related that the infection is rare and recovery even rarer.

Mr. Greb related that he was confined for a month and that his knee is still stiff. He was prompted to tell the Mail Tribune about the ailment by a news dispatch from Windsor, Ontario, that two youths were suffering from the rare infection. Only transfusions from a person who had type four blood and had recovered from streptococcus viridans would save their lives, the dispatch stated.

Thirty-one members of Medford high's Black Tornado, champions of the Southern Oregon football conference, received letters Friday night at a banquet in the high school building sponsored by several mothers of the players.
