## OAKLAND SEEKING TALENT TO HALT DAILY SLAUGHTER

Oakland dumped an outfielder and two pitchers today and hired a shortstop as Manager Dutch Zwilling sought a winning combination for the Pacific Coast league baseball team that has lost nine of its 11 games since the season opened two weeks ago.

Pitchers Hollis Thurston and Laury Vincel and Infielder Henry Martinez, were given their outright releases by Zwilling who in turn hired Eddie Montague who played with Seattle last season.

Montague made his debut in an Acorn uniform last night, made two hits and an error while Oakland was losing its ninth game, 11 to 5, to Portland. The game was loosely played. The Oaks made four errors, Portland three. The only highlights of the contest were five double plays, including one completed unassisted by Manager Bill Sweeney of Portland at first base.

Two home runs in succession in the last of the 12th gave Los Angeles a 7 to 6 win over Seattle. In a game marked by eight errors, four by each side, San Francisco walked past last year's champion San Diego team, 14 to 7.

A game which would have brought together teams piloted by the Killefer brothers, Wade of Hollywood and Bill of Sacramento, was postponed last night by threatening weather at Sacramento.

## BLACKHAWKS WIN STANLEY TROPHY

CHICAGO, April 13.—(AP)—Fleury Bill Stewart, a chunky little man of saved-off proportions, took his place today along with the late George Stallings as one of the miracle men of professional sports.

In his first year as manager of the amazing Chicago Blackhawks, Stewart led his team to a sensational victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs in the Chicago stadium last night to win the coveted Stanley cup, emblematic of the hockey championship of the world before 17,205 spectators.

It was the second time that the Blackhawks had won the championship. They captured it first in 1934. The score in the final game was 4 to 1.

The victory of the Blackhawks climaxed one of the outstanding comebacks in athletic history.

## MIKULAK, WARREN GET BOARD OKEH

EUGENE, April 13.—(AP)—Mike Mikulak, backfield coach, and John Warren, freshman mentor, last night were accepted as members of the University of Oregon coaching staff by the athletic board at the recommendation of Gerald A. Oliver, head coach.

Whether the appointment of the two graduate Webfoots will complete the grid coaching staff, along with Bill Cole, line coach, or whether a fourth man will be appointed, is problematical at present.

Other action taken by the board was a decision not to raise the student admission price to the Oregon-Oregon State football game in Portland, but to absorb the additional cost. Two sets of new bleachers were authorized to be built in McArthur court.

## ALLISON RETAINED AS COACH AT BAKER HIGH

BAKER, April 13.—(AP)—George "Stub" Allison, coach of the state championship basketball team, has been re-elected to coach athletics in the Baker high school.

Allison, who was expected to enter private business at the end of the spring term, will resume his duties in the fall at a salary said to be an increase over his present salary.

CHICAGO, April 13.—(AP)—The name of Mike Blazek, of Conneaut, Ohio, was listed today in the bowlers' hall of fame to roll a perfect 300 game in the 38 year history of the American Bowling Congress.

Blazek, who has been bowling for 20 years, struck out 12 times yesterday in the final game of his individual series for high game of the pin class at the coliseum. He started his singles event with mediocre games of 171 and 145.

Blazek was the first player to roll a perfect score in the six weeks' old tournament.

He entered the bowlers' hall of fame along with Billy Knox, Philadelphia; Charley Reilke, Racine, Wis.; Jack Karstens, Fort Sheridan, Ill.; and Carl Mensenber, Scranton, Pa., the other perfect shooters in national tournament competition.

The Ohioan has rolled four 300 games in match competition. Vogel's Windy City league team took second place last night in the five-man event with a smashing 3097 total. Soper Bros., Cleveo, Ill., went into third place with 3096.

## FIRST GARDENERS GAINED LITTLE IN WAY OF HARVEST

Ship Captain Planted Vegetables On Columbia River Island in 1795 — Left Before Crop Matured.

PORTLAND, (AP)—Truck gardens sprouting in loamy Oregon soil today stand as century-old memorials to the first three historic crops—one probably was never eaten, high water washed out the second and field mice grew fat on the third.

The WPA writers, earnest diggers into Oregon history, made a find appropriate to the season. They learned that Captain Bishop

brought the ship Ruby into the Columbia river in 1795, three years after Captain Gray's discovery, and planted beans, potatoes, peaches, radishes, mustard, celery and cress on a small island to relieve scurvy among the crew. The ship left before the crop matured and the government diggers haven't discovered if the sailors returned.

A settlement established 45 miles inland in 1810 by Captain Nathan and Winship of the Albatross forgot about spring floods and all the valuable vegetable seeds were destroyed. Gabriel Franchere, clerk for the Astor party, supervised the planting of a garden at Astoria in 1811. The plants reached the bloom stage and then the ground mice went to work. Franchere saved 12 potatoes and succeeded in raising 190.

Alexander Henry, who wintered in Oregon for the Northwest Fur company, planted potatoes and cabbage in 1813. He died before the harvest and the success or failure of the venture was not set forth.
