

### GILL'S OPPONENT REPEATS CHARGE HIS ADS BARRED

#### Ralph W. Perry Claims Master Prevented Publication of Platform As Paid Ad in Grange Bulletin.

PORTLAND, April 12.—(AP)—Ralph W. Perry of Hood River, candidate for state Grange master, reiterated charges today that Ray W. Gill, master, had prevented him from publishing his platform as a paid advertisement in the Grange Bulletin.

Perry, who held a slight lead over Gill in the election returns from 22 local Granges in 10 counties, also said he had been refused a mailing list for use in sending his platform to Grange members.

#### Personalities Banned

Gill explained that the Grange law provided that a "nominee may use not to exceed one-third of a column in a March issue of the Grange Bulletin for a brief history and a picture of the nominee but no personalities disparaging to any other nominee will be permitted."

"Mr. Perry used the one-third column he was allowed along with other candidates," the master said. He added that Perry failed to accept an invitation to appeal to the executive committee.

Gill denied Perry's charge that the mailing list had been supplied to Ben T. Osborne, executive secretary of the State Federation of Labor, to obtain support for the A.F.L. during a jurisdictional clash with the C.I.O.

#### Present Officers Favored

"Contributions of the new candidate to the Bulletin are strictly taboo," Perry asserted, "while the present officers fill the columns of every issue."

J. O. Farr of the Ankeny Grange and W. H. Stevens of the North Howell unit, both in Marion counties, criticized Gill support by A. V. Heyman of Albany.

"Heyman is or has been one of the officials of the Oregon Commonwealth Federation, political arm of the C.I.O.," they said.

They charged the Bulletin had given free publicity to Dr. J. F. Hoesch, former People's Power league head and for a time a democratic candidate for governor, while Governor Charles Martin paid \$125 for a page advertisement.

### HOLY WEEK RITES START THURSDAY AT SACRED HEART

Holy Week services in Sacred Heart church will begin with high mass Thursday morning at 8 o'clock. Special devotions will be conducted Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

On Good Friday, mass of the presanctified and veneration of the cross will begin at 8 o'clock. The seven last words, commemorating the agony and death of our Lord will begin at 12 noon and end at 3 o'clock. Rev. Father Vincent Richard, district chaplain, Civilian Conservation corps, will conduct the meditations on the "Seven Last Words."

Friday evening at 7:30, the way of the cross will be followed by veneration of the cross.

Confessions will be heard Wednesday night from 7:30 to 9:00; on Thursday and Friday evenings after services, on Saturday afternoon from 2 to 4 and in the evening beginning at 7:30.
