

POSTER CONTESTS GET ATTENTION OF STUDENT ARTISTS

Advanced students in the senior high school art department are busy these days completing their entries for a number of interesting and varied poster contests. The posters are being worked out under direction of Miss Elizabeth Crisell, art supervisor of the city schools.

Phillip Henselman, a junior in high school, recently won the Oregon state first prize in a contest conducted by the Future Craftsmen organization. His poster, done in art classes, had for its theme "Safety in Industry." Its striking effect depended on a modern treatment of machine forms in different values of spray on a black background with a skull lurking in back and a warning in bold red letters, "Death Awaits the Careless Workman."

Ten clever and unusual posters have just been submitted as entries for the third national meat poster contest. Other contests on which the students are now working are the American Legion National Poppy Poster contest, the poster competition for the New York World's Fair of 1939, and National Music Week posters, which will be on display in downtown windows the last week of April.

The art classes are specially studying good design and layout and new techniques and developments in the field of commercial art.

EKERSON WINS SUIT IN KLAMATH COURT

A Klamath county circuit court jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant in the case of Charles F. Karlik versus Herman L. Ekerson, owner of the Ekerson Paint and Roofing store here. The case was tried in Klamath Falls, Judge Edward B. Ashurst presiding.

Mr. Karlik alleged a breach of an employment contract and sued for \$1300. Mr. Ekerson denied the breach and made a counter-claim for \$217.85. The verdict awarded Mr. Ekerson the amount claimed.

COUNTY JAILER TAXED FOR NIGHT FACILITIES TO ACCOMMODATE 48

With an above-average number of prisoners, the Jackson county jailer, E. L. Clow, was taxed for facilities last night and found it necessary to procure extra mattresses.

There were 48 prisoners in jail overnight. Thirty-one of them were federal prisoners being held for trial or grand jury action. The government pays for prisoners housed temporarily in the county jail, the payment just about covering expenses, Sheriff Syd L. Brown said.

There were already 21 federal prisoners in the jail when Deputy Marshal Paul Hanlin arrived last night with ten more from Klamath Falls.

The new prisoners were listed as Dale Willard, 26, Chiloquin, held under \$10,000 bail after a hearing before the U. S. Commissioner in Klamath Falls yesterday on a charge of burglarizing the Chiloquin postoffice; Lee Hixon, 18, Chiloquin Indian, charged with larceny; and Frank Begg, 48, Klamath Falls, charged with violation of a parole which freed him after serving seven months of a 18-month sentence for selling liquor to Indians.

Also the following, all charged with selling liquor to Indians: John Leeper, 56, Klamath Falls, Robert Forer, 33, Central Point, Michael Godfrey, 26, Klamath Falls, Neil McGrath, 28, Klamath Falls, Haves Posa, 33, Chiloquin, Bruce Woodcock, 48, Klamath Falls, and Charles Bogart, 51, Chiloquin.
