

# JUVENILE STARS' FUTURE FORTUNE PROTECTED NOW

### Shirley Temple, Deanna Durbin and Others of Modern Flock Are Note Likely to Duplicate Coogan Case

HOLLYWOOD, April 15.—(AP)—Shirley Temple, when she comes of age, will not have to go to court to obtain the fortune she amassed as a child movie star.

Neither will Deanna Durbin, Jane Wilshire, Mickey Rooney, Freddie Bartholomew or any other of the movie youngsters whose names are emblazoned on theater marquees.

The present plight of Jackie Coogan, who has sued his mother and his stepfather for an accounting of his film earnings as a child, which he estimates at \$4,000,000, seems to have been anticipated by the studios and the parents of the present-day juvenile stars.

Deanna Guarded Deanna Durbin, for instance: Her earnings (estimated at \$800 a day) are handled by her father, James Durbin, who is investing them in life insurance and real estate.

Jackie Coogan's checks from the movie studio are deposited in his name to the Jackie Coogan estate account in a bank, which is his financial guardian. The bank must obtain court approval of every investment.

Shirley Temple's earnings from the movies and commercial royalties, which run quite a way up in four figures, are well regulated by her contract, at least insofar as the movie salary is concerned. Checks are sent in her contract at the instance of Winfield Sheehan and elaborated on by Joseph M. Schenck and Darryl Zanuck in her new deal, that specify when, where and how much of her money shall be invested.

Freddie On Way Freddie Bartholomew's finances have been the subject of much litigation but now that his custody has been settled in the hands of Aunt Clara, a monetary program has been worked out and he will be financially independent when he is old enough to vote.

In Jackie Coogan's case, he was earning \$5,000 a week 10 years ago, and his father took charge of all the money, Jackie getting only \$6.25 a week. His father was killed in an automobile accident shortly before Jackie became of age, and his mother married Arthur L. Bernstein.

Bernstein and his wife say Jackie has received all he is entitled to, and that under California law the money earned by minors goes to the parents.

## WATER PROVIDED FOR ARID AREAS

WASHINGTON (UP)—The bureau of reclamation has indicated that there will be an adequate supply of water for irrigation in the arid and semi-arid areas of the West during the summer.

Two new irrigation storage reservoirs, put into service this month, brought the total number of federal reservoirs which will be useful this summer to 74.

The new reservoirs were those created by Unity dam, on Burnt River, Ore., and Caballo dam on the Rio Grande, N. M. Unity dam, now completed, has created a reservoir of 25,360 acre-feet, while the Caballo dam, 78 per cent completed will create a reservoir with a capacity of 350,000 acre-feet.

## CHILDREN SUFFERING HEART DAMAGE FROM WEEK-END EXCESSSES

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 15.—(AP) Modern week-ends are making the child an easy prey to heart disease, in the opinion of Dr. Harold White. The chief medical health officer of Vancouver's Metropolitan Health Board in an address to a health-week meeting here declared that already one per cent of the children in Vancouver schools and elsewhere have chronic heart ailments.

"We have 46,000 children in our metropolitan area and the lack of sleep and the fatigue show in their faces on Monday morning," he said. "There was never such a time in the world's history when there was so much lack of sleep and lack of repose."

Misuse of modern inventions such as the radio and motion pictures was given as a contributing cause by the doctor.

"I am not saying that these are not good things," he said, "but they should not be allowed to rob the child of sleep."

"One would think that our week-ends would be the time for rest, but we may as well admit they are the time for mild dissipation."
