

**Republic Steel Boss Sees Red Ink Ahead**  
 JERSEY CITY, N. J., April 15.—(AP)—Tom M. Girdler, chairman of the board of Republic Steel corporation, told stockholders at the annual meeting today the company was operating

at less than 90 percent of capacity as was the industry as a whole. The company will show a loss for the first quarter, he said.  
 "I wouldn't say that 1938 shows much promise of being a good year for the steel industry or for Republic steel," Girdler said.

**Uncle Sam To Pay For Spoiled Eggs**  
 WASHINGTON, April 15.—(AP)—The senate claims committee decided today the government owes \$150 to Richard D. Krensek of Graham, Wn., because only 20 of his setting of 250

turkey eggs hatched out in 1936. Conceding that WPA blasting operations in the vicinity undoubtedly destroyed the eggs' fertility, the committee followed Senator Schwartz (D., Wyo.) through a complicated arithmetical problem to arrive at the \$450 figure.
