

MEDICAL SOCIETY OFFERS HELP FOR CHILD HEALTH DAY

Jackson County Medical society was today pledged to cooperate with the state board of health in observing "Child Health Day" May 1. The society voted its assistance at its meeting Wednesday night in Valentine's cafe. The question of child health was brought out in a talk by Dr. John Able, state assistant director of the children's program. Dr. Able described the state program for the care of crippled children. He told of plans to hold a clinic here for crippled children some time in May with Dr. Richard Dillehunt, Portland specialist, in charge. Such clinics have been held here periodically for the past ten years. The society voted to hold a symposium on the child problem at its next meeting on April 27. Presenting the paper of the evening, Dr. F. G. Thayer discussed infections of the eye. He said that the eye has inherent resistance to infections and that, unless there is a reduced body resistance, errors of refraction or mechanical injury to its

delicate covering, most germs will not cause infection. He added, however, that some virulent germs can produce infection without other cause. Through a new method of obtaining and staining the germs responsible for infection, it is now possible to direct treatment specifically for the type of germ present, Dr. Thayer said. Dr. C. I. Drummond was host. At the next meeting Dr. Edwin H. Durno will be host.

GRANT LANDS CLOSED FOR RECLASSIFICATION

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 15.—(AP)—Closure of O. and C. grant lands in Oregon to all forms of application except timber sales, was announced here today by the U. S. land office. C. P. Spaulding, acting register, reported receipt of a telegram from the general office at Washington, D. C. advising that the lands are not available for grazing or homestead application pending a reclassification to determine most suitable future use.

EASTER PLAY AT SALVATION ARMY

"The Half of My Goods," an Easter play by Ralph P. Claggett, will be presented by a cast of seven at the Salvation Army Sunday at 8:00 p. m. The play concerns the life of Zacchaeus, Jewish collector of Roman revenues. He is represented to have married a wife out of the Hellenistic world and to have been the father of a charming little daughter, and a son not altogether to his liking. Though he desires to be an honest man, he is urged on to illigitimate gain by the socially ambitious Greek whom he has married. His son, Thaddaeus, becomes involved as a member of the robber band of Barabbas and is guilty of the murder of a merchant prince. Eventually Thaddaeus is crucified, at the same time as Jesus, and is represented to have been the young thief who prayed, "Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom." He receives the assurance, "Today thou shalt be with me in paradise." The news of Jesus' resurrection brings Zacchaeus and his wife Patricia, the assurance that because Jesus lives, their son Thaddaeus lives also.
