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REBELS CLOSE IN ON TORTOSA CITY; FALL SEEN NEAR

Key City of Southern Catalonia Scene of Drive by General Valino's Forces — Other Towns Fall

HENDAYE, France, at the Spanish Frontier, April 18.—(AP)—The fall of Tortosa, key city of southern Catalonia, appeared imminent today as Gen. Garcia Valino's insurgent army corps closed in on it from three sides.

A semi-circle of insurgent steel, converging on a 100-mile radius, broke through outlying defenses and forced Spanish government troops back to the Ebro river.

General Valino's highly-mobile columns captured Santa Barbara and Amposta, respectively seven miles south and eight miles southeast of Tortosa and controlling vital approaches to that coastal city.

Between Amposta, on the coast just above where the Ebro fans out into its marshy delta and chert, north of Tortosa, the insurgents have caught in a pocket an unknown number of government militiamen, whose only line of escape is believed to be the Ebro bridge in Tortosa itself.

Moadenverga, halfway between Amposta and Santa Barbara, also was captured.

WM. R. CHAPPELL DIES SUDDENLY

William Raymond Chappell, 53, died suddenly of a heart attack in his home on the Mankins ranch south of Jacksonville Saturday afternoon. He had just returned from a Medford shopping trip when he succumbed.

Mr. Chappell was born in St. Peter, Minn., May 30, 1885. He had been a resident of Jacksonville eight months. He is survived by his wife, Jessie May, and two sons, George of Jacksonville and Warren of Minneapolis, Minn.

Funeral arrangements were being made today by the Perri Funeral home.
