

### THIRD OF THOSE SENT TO PRISON FAIL TO REFORM

#### Thirty Per Cent Of Those Paroled Violate Pledge—Many Serve One Prison Sentence After Another.

SALEM, Ore., April 21.—(AP)—If signs "Leave Your Hopes Behind" were placed over the gates of Oregon's three corrective and penal institutions, it would be true for 30 per cent of the state's criminals.

The truth lies in the fact that almost one-third of all persons sent to the institutions—penitentiary, boys' training school and girls' industrial school—come back to serve time for crimes after they are released.

**80 Per Cent Habitual.**  
About 80 per cent of the 1000 convicts in the penitentiary have served at least one term before the one they are now serving. Of this number, 37 are serving their fourth term, 17 their fifth, seven their sixth and two their eighth.

Almost 30 per cent of those paroled from the penitentiary also violate their paroles and are sent back to finish their original sentences. These men are quite a problem for the parole officers who must supervise them, because the officers each must watch 163 men.

**Boys Go Back.**  
The boys' training school has a record of 37 per cent of the boys it has released since 1900 coming back to serve additional sentences. Ten per cent of the boys released "graduate" into the penitentiary when they get older.

Twenty per cent of the girls released from the industrial school are returned.

Which brings to mind a statement by a board of control member: "Our parole officers have so many people to supervise that they can't do a proper job of rehabilitating them in society."

### YOUNG DEMOCRATS TO OPEN STATE CONCLAVE IN PENDLETON FRIDAY

PENDLETON, April 21.—(AP)—"Welcome" signs festooning Pendleton's streets herald the state convocation of Young Democratic clubs which will be held here Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

### NORTH IDAHO SURVEYS FAR-FLUNG DAMAGE AS FLOOD WATERS RECEDE

WALLACE, Idaho, April 21.—(AP)—With two persons drowned, north Idaho viewed far-flung flood devastation today and estimated damage would pass the half million dollar mark.

An accurate estimate of losses was virtually impossible as rain and snow-swollen streams out of the mountains continued to recede. The run-off raised lower reaches of rivers draining the vast inland region.

Crew leaders here estimated it would be a month before conditions could be restored to normal. Washed-out roads and rail lines, tottering bridges and homes, debris-strewn streets and lawns marked the course of the most disastrous inundation in this mining region since 1933.

The Coeur D'Alene river at Rose lake, 30 miles west of here, claimed the lives of Jack Cochran and John Ojal, both about 24. One slipped from a dike into the muddy, surging stream, and the other lost his life trying to aid him.

### Easter Services Held In Forest At McKee Bridge

BIG APPLEGATE, April 21.—(Sp.)—In the characteristic seclusion of deep mountain solitude, with tall trees standing by and the Applegate river lending its steady murmur to the sacredness of the hour, 51 people of the Beaver Creek Sunday school gathered at the McKee Bridge forest park Easter morning for 6 o'clock sunrise services.

Although softly clouded skies prevented the beauty of an actual sunrise, all were brought to feel the true significance of the Easter morning through the inspiring sermon delivered by Rev. D. D. Randall of Medford, missionary of the American Sunday school union, who brought as a guest E. H. Martin of Portland, district superintendent of the union.

Responsive readings were led by Mrs. Wallace Haskell, after which Mr. Martin opened the service with a prayer and brief remarks.

The service was closed with a benediction by Mr. Martin, who has served the Sunday school union for 40 years as superintendent for Oregon, Washington, and Idaho. Mr. Randall has given his service for 21 years.

An 8 o'clock breakfast, prepared on the camp stores, with an occasional potato fried over the ever honored open camp fire, was served on the rustic tables with which the camp is equipped. Youngsters exulted in an Easter egg hunt about the beauty spots of the camp ground after breakfast.

### Driving Student Backs Auto Into Forgotten Well

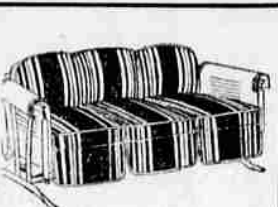
