

POWER DISTRICT DEFEAT CITED IN RAP AT NEW DEAL

Republican Snell of New York Calls Congress Attention to Recent Ballot in Oregon—Officials Are Silent

By JOHN L. WHEELER Associated Press Oregon Correspondent WASHINGTON, April 21.—(AP)—Federal officials have remained silent about the unfavorable Oregon public power district election. Secretary Ickes had nothing to say at his press conference last week. He said he was awaiting word from Bonneville Administrator Row.

The election result, however, was called to the attention of congress by Representative Snell (R., N.Y.), who said the vote appeared to be "strong evidence" that the people did not want "these gigantic projects imposed upon them from Washington."

"This also demonstrates how the New Deal constantly is creating new difficulties for the country," he said. "Bonneville dam will be completed in about a year, but the people of the immediate vicinity have already emphatically disapproved the proposed distribution scheme."

Oregon's share in the New Deal fiscal program amounted to \$323,712,276 at the end of 1937. . . the grand total of grants, loans and loans insured.

Portly Alben Barkley, the majority floor leader in the senate, disclosed the sum during a Jefferson day address here.

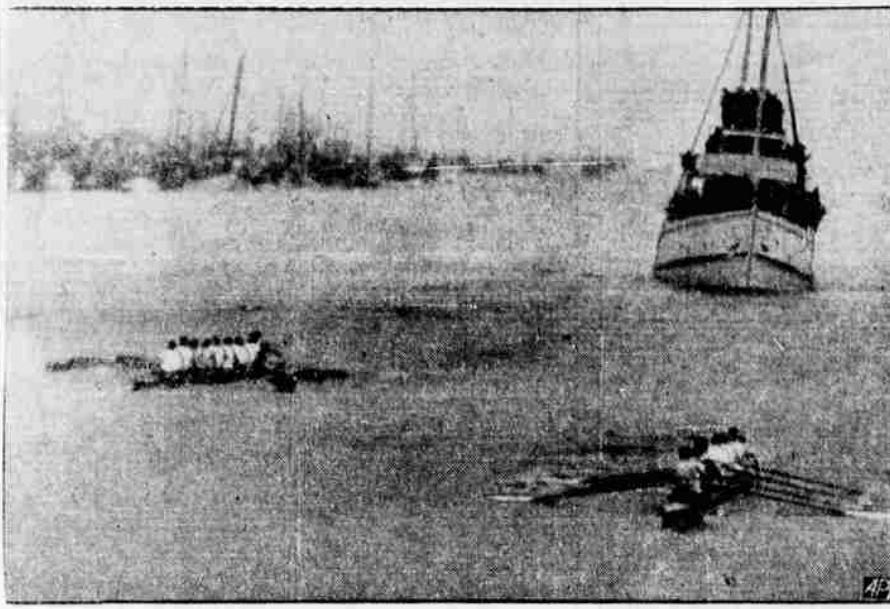
The Kentucky senator disclosed the expenditures were in accord with Jeffersonian principles. Barkley mentioned the figure after citing the Jeffersonian belief in "support of the state governments in all their rights, so the most competent administrations for our domestic concerns and the purest bulwarks against anti-republican tendencies."

"Today the sovereignty of the 48 states is not questioned by a single citizen and the mother government has responded in unity to protect her citizens during a period which threatened with economic collapse," Barkley said.

Figures Quoted Barkley's figures were based on computations from March 4, 1933, when the president took office, to January 1, 1938.

Classified as "expenditures," largely grants, were the following Oregon figures: Agricultural adjustment administration, \$14,253,280; farm security administration, \$238,838; civil works

1501 CCC CAMPS TO BE OPERATED IN COMING YEAR

Congressional Approval of Additional Funds to Keep Set-Up Intact—Over Half Goes for Supplies

WASHINGTON, April 21.—(AP)—The civilian conservation corps will operate 1,501 camps for another year. Director Robert Fechner said today, as a result of congressional approval of an additional \$50,000,000 appropriation.

President Roosevelt in his new recovery program, was authorized by the senate yesterday. The house previously had voted for it. Mostly For Supplies Fechner estimated that more than one-half the CCC appropriation, now increased to \$278,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, will be spent on supplies, including food, clothes and equipment. The remainder will be distributed in wages to about 271,000 enrolled men.

The camps, Fechner said, will be continued in their present locations with the exception of at which will be moved from army reservations to other sites. Started more than five years ago as Mr. Roosevelt's first recovery project, the CCC has given employment to approximately 2,200,000 persons at various times. When the president suggested the corps, he said he wanted to change disheartened, hopeless youths into self-supporting independent members of society.

During the quarter ended September 30, 1937, Fechner said, 9,791 enrollees obtained private jobs because of training received in camp. Much Work Done The national conservation program carried out by CCC has included the following: 1,235,262,000 forest trees planted; 64,231 miles of telephone line erected; 41,133 bridges construct-

ed; 44,475 major type buildings completed; 3,982,720 erosion check dams built; 2,988,307 acres of forest lands improved; 16,722,021 acres cleared of plant diseases and pests; 120,310 miles of roads and trails built; 4,130,500 man-days spent fighting forest fires.

Thousands of acres of forests and park lands improved for recreational use. Of the \$30 a month paid each enrollee, \$25 has gone to aid dependents at home, Fechner said, estimating that perhaps 10,000,000 persons have been aided directly through the CCC program.

A typical CCC camp has an enrolled strength of from 180 to 200 men. Although there are no military drills or regulations, reserve army officers have charge of the men except when they are at work. They are under the control of a technical staff.

Over the educational program more than 65,000 boys have been taught to read and write, nearly 350,000 have been better grounded in elementary school subjects, and more than 350,000 have taken high school courses.

COMMITTEE APPROVES VENEREAL FIGHT BILL

WASHINGTON, April 21.—(AP)—The house interstate commerce committee approved today the LaFollette-Bulwinkle bill for federal control of venereal diseases.

The legislation, as revised by the committee, would authorize a \$15,000,000 appropriation for the first three years after the act became effective, starting with \$3,000,000 the first year and increasing \$2,000,000 annually.

The legislation has passed the senate.
