

COUNTY GRANGES ARE PLANNING AID FOR ELTON PETRI

Jackson county's 16 Grange units are endeavoring to work out plans for the care of Elton Petri, talent

farm youth, when he returns soon from Warm Springs, Ga., where he has been receiving treatment for infantile paralysis for almost two years. The Granges have been looking after Mr. Petri's welfare since he was stricken with the crippling disease, and it was through their efforts that he was sent to the eastern health center. Recently Grange dances have been held to raise a fund to pay Mr. Petri's traveling expenses home. Now the Granges are confronted with the more serious problem of Elton's welfare after he gets back. It is understood that Elton will not

be able to resume farm work. He is still crippled by the dread disease and must use crutches to get around. He will need an attendant to help him on the long journey from Warm Springs and the Granges have issued a call for a volunteer. Dr. C. E. Irwin, chief surgeon at the Warm Springs foundation, wrote to a Grange committee here that Mr. Petri has been a splendid patient and that he deserves "any assistance that can be obtained for him in his endeavor to become self-supporting." Elton is "worthy and conscientious and will make the most

of any help that is given him," Dr. Irwin wrote. Dr. Irwin said Elton has received training in various handicrafts which might prove of some practical value to him if needed equipment is provided. Grange leaders, however, doubt the value of such work. The Grange committee trying to find practical ways of assisting Mr. Petri to economic independence is composed of W. W. Robison, John Holtz and H. E. Kneeland. The committee is eager to receive suggestions from the public. Elton's family owned a good dairy

ranch on which the youth worked. The whole family was stricken with a quick succession of misfortunes after Elton had been stricken with infantile paralysis. "It was a fine, industrious family, among the best in the county, when misfortune befell their home," said Charles C. Hoover, Grange leader. "Now we must do something to help Elton."
