

Dinneen Through Calling 'Em Receives Sportdom's Tribute

SYRACUSE, N. Y., April 21.—(AP)—Sportdom's great and once-great went into official retirement today as Bill Dinneen, who "called 'em as he seen 'em" in major leagues for 27 years.

Dinneen, honored at a dinner here last night, because a member of the "most devoted profession in sports"—a baseball umpire—after a career that took him to the top of another branch of his chosen field, a major league pitcher.

His pitching reached a peak in the 1909 world series when he helped the Boston Red Sox win from the Pittsburgh Pirates by taking three of the four games he pitched, including the one that clinched the title.

The dinner, attended by 1,500 persons, was described by Alan Gould, sports editor of the Associated Press, as setting "an all-time, all-American record as a tribute to an umpire."

On plays and plays were recalled and incidents from the 40 years of Dinneen's service in baseball were recounted by Governor Hildreth, Johnny Evers, Eddie Collins and other notables.

Pioneer Rosebush On Logtown Site Carefully Tended

BIO APPROPRIATE. April 21.—It's only a humble, old fashioned yellow rose bush of many years and uncut blossoms in bloom this season which grows by the dusty wayside. Yet some kindly soul has given this historic bush at old Logtown on the Jacksonville-Rich highway a gardener's attention this spring. The hardy earth around the bush has been riddled up and enclosed with rocks, and the branches have been neatly pruned.

Whether it was some inner regard for pioneer tradition or simple love for a common flower which pleased some person to do this remains to be guessed. The bush is the only visible sign of the early day miners' town here and it is thought probable that it was planted 50 years ago by a member of the John Moxie family, whose home was located near where the bush grows. The bush, with its fragrant little flowers, has been photographed by an Oregon writer and nature lover.

INSURGENT PILOTS RAIN BOMBS UPON VILLAGES, TROOPS

22 Civilians Killed in One Town — French Take Precautions to Prevent Spread Across Frontier

REPUBLICAN, France (At the Spanish Border). April 21.—(AP)—Spanish insurgent airmen today bombed one of the principal railway stations of Northern Catalonia in a drive to smash the remaining land links between Catalonia and France.

At least 22 civilians were killed and 30 injured at Puigcerda, Pyrenees gateway, where a Catalonian railway reaches the French border at one of the three frontier passes remaining under government control.

Six hours after the noon hour bombardment, rescue crews dug in the debris of the railway station and other Puigcerda buildings reported recovery of 22 bodies.

Railroad Target
Sweeping low to rain bombs and machine-gun bullets, Generalissimo Francisco Franco's planes raided a 40-mile branch railroad between Puigcerda and Ripoll in upper Catalonia province.

Three trains in the Puigcerda yards were struck by bombs. One, loaded with "chemical products" from France, burned fiercely.

French and Spanish authorities summoned first aid workers from both sides of the border. Spanish frontier guards, however, refused to permit anyone except French physicians to cross into Spain and held back Spanish civilians seeking to flee into France.

Villages were attacked on either side of the border. Bombs even fell on isolated farm houses. French authorities took prompt precautions against spread of the offensive to French soil. French mobile guards reinforced frontier posts and French anti-aircraft gunners fired red rockets to warn the insurgent airmen.

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
