WASHINGTON, D. C., April 19.—(Special Correspondence)—Senator and Mrs. Alfred Evan Reames, Medford, and Representative James W. Mott will be guests of Mrs. Gilbert E. Holt, vice-state regent and state regent elect, in the Oregon box at various evening sessions of the D. A. R. congress here, Mrs. Chas. I. McNary, wife of the senior senator from Oregon, attended the opening wore a smart, dead-black chiffon gown and a rope of gleaming gardenias across the left shoulder. Mrs. Holt's gown was aqua lace.

Mrs. James W. Mott, wife of southern Oregon's representative in congress, did not accompany Congressman Mott to Washington this year. PORTLAND, April 21.—(AP)—A Yamhill county delegation at a meeting sponsored by the Oregon Farm Chemurgic council said yesterday that manufacture of fuel alcohol from wastes would begin soon at Dayton.

The farmers, business men and chemists met to open a campaign for one of four federal farm research laboratories here.

The Yamhill group said English motor fuels, supplied by a major oil company, were one-third alcohol.

SCHOOL DISTRICT CHANGE STUDIED

No action was taken by the county school boundary board, following a hearing yesterday afternoon upon application of the Sams Valley school district for a change in the boundary line of the Tolo district, which would give them additional property valuation and aid in reduction of the school tax levy. The matter was taken under advisement.

Petitioners at the meeting brought out that the sole purpose for the change, was to secure a lower valuation for the Sams Valley district, which has a high school millage of 18 mills. The change would include California Oregon Power company and Southern Pacific railroad property, and add them to the Sams Valley tax rolls. Sams Valley is strictly an agricultural district, with no large taxpayers.

Tolo district has only two school children, and they are attending adjoining district schools. Sams Valley has an enrollment of 79 children.

SEALS WHACK STARS, 11 TO 9 TO GAIN TIE FOR SECOND POSITION

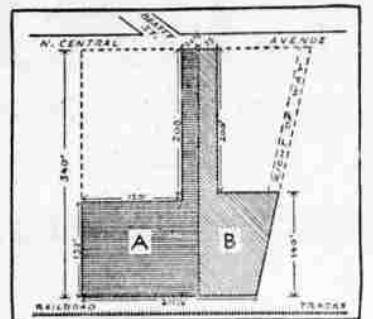
