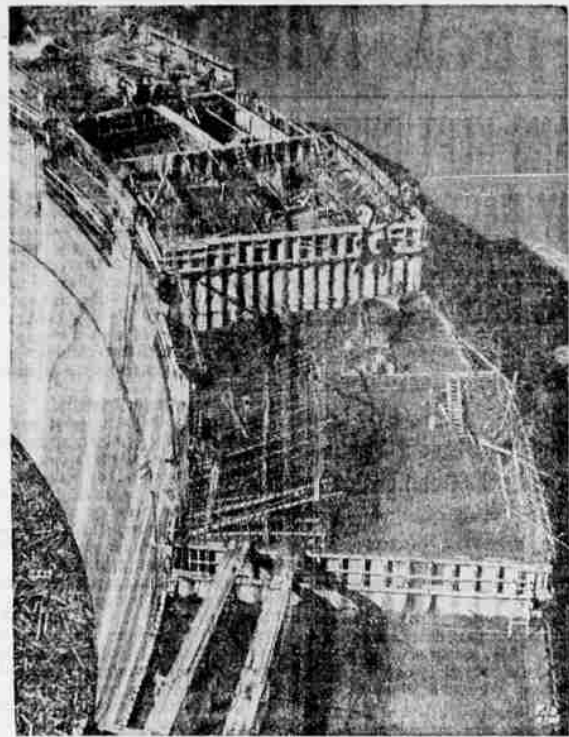


CHILOQUIN WATER CONTINUES RISE; LOGS PERIL SPAN

KLAMATH FALLS, April 21.—(AP)—Water in the Sprague and Williamson rivers continuing its steady rise today, with a log boom at the Blocklinger mill at Chiloquin straining at its moorings and threatening severe damage should it break away.

Flood crest was expected to arrive late tomorrow night or early Saturday. The rise for the 24 hours ending at 8 o'clock this morning was registered at 4 1/2 inches on the official gauge below Chiloquin. Unofficial observers at that place estimated that by this afternoon the level had increased a foot from yesterday.

Railroad men said they thought the S. P. trestle could survive if the log boom goes out, but grave fears were felt for the W. Williamson river highway bridge, several miles below Chiloquin, the single slim traffic link between Klamath Falls, northern Klamath county and central Oregon.

TWO TRAINS BRING CCC CONTINGENTS

Two special CCC trains arrived from the fourth corps area (southern states) yesterday with replacements for camps of the Medford district.

The first, commanded by Capt. Albert T. Anderson, arrived yesterday from Port Brown, North Carolina, with 227 men of whom 117 were for Camp Hackamore and 110 for Camp Clear Lake, both in northern California.

With Capt. Anderson on the train were Dr. Charles J. Kinsolving, train surgeon, and Lieut. Charles H. Maddox, mess officer.

The second train, commanded by Capt. William H. Driscoll, arrived here from Port Mather, Georgia, with 395 men. Of these, 80 were for Oregon Caves, 85 for Steamboat, 125 for Coos Head and 105 for China Flats. With Capt. Driscoll were Lt. Col. Harry McKellar of Vancouver Barracks, and Capt. H. T. Gentle, of Medford, train surgeon; Lieut. Herbert S. Martin, of Big Springs, mess officer, and Lieut. Maurice W. Frier, a newcomer to the district, who will be assigned to a camp here.

MODEL OF CATHEDRAL BUILT FROM MATCHES

MT. MORRIS, N. Y.—(AP)—Ralph Ferraro, a patient at the Mt. Morris tuberculosis hospital, has spent eight months building a model cathedral from 18,808 used safety matches collected from other persons under treatment at the hospital.

Working in bed with a safety razor and glue as his only accessories, he completed the structure in 76 days. It is 18 inches wide, 24 inches long and 12 inches high. In one steeple is a bell operated by a bell cord from below and in the other steeple is a clock.

The interior, which is free from supports, contains a carpet, pews and three altars fitted with altar cloths and candles. A small electric light bulb in the ceiling sheds subdued light.
