

Classy Klamath Red Sox Will Invade Craters' Diamond Sunday

LOCALS TO FACE TOUGH OPPONENTS IN TUNE-UP TILT

Game Scheduled for 2:30 Sharp at High School — Visitors Boast Leading Pitcher of Own League

Southern Oregon league pennant winners in 1935 and 1936, and last season runners-up to Mount Shasta City in the strong Northern California circuit.

That's the sort of a Klamath Falls Red Sox ball club Manager Orio Oakes will bring to Medford Sunday to give the Craters their second acid test before the opening of the S. O. L. May 8. Opening pitch of the exhibition clash will be at 2:30 sharp on the fine high school turf ball park.

Leading Pitcher
Clyde "Curse-Ball" Carlstrom, league leading pitcher of the Northern California circuit last season and the guy who stood Southern Oregon league batters on their collective heads for two years, will probably open for the mound for the colorful Red Sox, with Hogan, Turpin and Scope in reserve.

Manager Wally Rickert of the Medford club will send either Larry Pepper or Ray Erickson to the rubber. Pepper, last year with the Craters, signed early this spring with Ashland but has since been returned to Medford.

The appearance of the Red Sox will be their first in Medford since 1935, when they ran roughshod over all Southern Oregon league teams to win the pennant with ease. The following year, 1936, with Medford out of the league, Klamath Falls again showed its heels to the rest of the pack, defeating Glendale in the playoff game, 1 to 0. Last season, looking for new fields to conquer, the Red Sox pulled out of the S. O. L. and entered the Northern California loop, and after a blazing battle down the stretch, dropped the third and deciding game of a Shaugnessy playoff series to Mount Shasta City. The Sox are entered in the Northern California league again this year, and are considered odds-on favorites to grab the title.

19 on Roster
Manager Oakes will bring 19 players to Medford, most of them members of the Red Sox for the past three years. Besides the four pitchers already named, the Sox roster includes the catchers, Fryer, Page and Pastega; infielders, Bernie, Bernadot, Brooks, Sandstrom, Herschberger, Lloyd, Moore and Duracha; and outfielders, Hamrickson, Molotore, Bergland, Switzer and Shipman. Many of these players were members of the Klamath Falls softball team which defeated Timber Products here last season in the district championship battle.

The Craters have been working out daily this week, and Manager Rickert announces his team in excellent condition for what will undoubtedly prove one of the best ball games of the year. The club will be strengthened considerably, with Cliff "Chief" McLean back on the plate. Remainder of the lineup will probably be Lowell Brown on first, Manager Rickert at second, Dick Lewis at short, Aris Ager at third, Russ Acheson on George Harrington in the field, Dick Sakraida in center, and Paul "Hoosier" Haffard in right.

The reaction of Crater hitters against a first class curve ball will be determined with finality against the Red Sox. Carlstrom, right-handed ace, possesses one of the finest hooks ever thrown by a hurler hereabouts, and he has been almost unbeatable in southern Oregon semi-pro baseball for several years.

WADDELL PERFECT AT RIFLE MATCH

In a 40-shot prone match, instead of the usual four-position shooting, on the indoor rifle range last night, Ivan Waddell "went clean" with a 400x400 using iron sights. Telescopic sights were penalized one point on each target, or four points in the four hundred. ANGLING AND SKIING MADE POOR BY RAINS, FAST MELTING SNOW

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:

"Fast melting snow and rains last night point toward poorer fishing and skiing conditions in the higher elevations this week-end.

"Rain was reported at Union Creek and at Butte Falls last night. The snow depth at Union Creek is 17 inches. Snow is melting fast. Skiing will be poor at the ski run. Streams in the area are reported to be muddy and high.

"Butte creek is high and milky. Few fair catches have been made but in general fishing has been poor.

"Two and one-half feet of snow are reported at Fish Lake and part of the lake is free from ice. The road is still closed to Fish Lake from 2 1/2 miles above Mosquito guard station. The distance that is blocked with snow is about 7 1/2 miles.

"Four feet of snow is reported at Trail camp on Mt. Ashland. Skiing is expected to be poor over the weekend due to fast melting snow."

EX-GANGSTER CHIEF HELD IN WIDE PLOT OF CHECK FORGERS

CHICAGO, April 22. — (AP) — George "Bugs" Moran, prohibition era gangster chief, and five other persons were seized here today by police investigating a nation-wide plot to pass counterfeit travelers' checks.

Three Chicago men accused of being members of a counterfeit ring were arrested at Pittsburgh last night.

Police of the state's attorney's office who made the arrests here expressed the opinion as much as \$1,000,000 in counterfeit American Express company checks had been printed for distribution in principal cities of the nation.

Moran, seven of whose benches were machine-gunned to death in the St. Valentine's day massacre, was held at the detective bureau during the night. He and the others denied being involved in a counterfeit ring.

Assistant State's Attorney Robert Wright announced those seized here included Frank J. Parker, airplane pilot known as the "flying bootlegger" during prohibition days, Walter Nolan, an employe of a coin vending machine company, Marie Ribble Loren Gant, and a woman whose name was not divulged.

The seven principal virtues in medieval Christian ethics were: purity, obedience, benevolence, faith, hope, love and humility.

LONDON, April 22. — (AP) — A bootblack bowled out the British Empire's greatest cricketer—and the gentlemanly English sports world trembled.

Don Bradman, captain of the Australian team here for the "world series" with an English team, was practicing at the famed Lords cricket ground. Paul Brooks, 15, the bootblack, pitched to Bradman, the Empire's Babe Ruth. Bradman swung and missed and the ball knocked out the middle stump of the wicket, which is equal to three strikes and out in baseball.

Today the youngster is the Empire's hero, with pictures in the papers and interviews and stories on "How I bowled Bradman out."

Cricket fans are hysterical and the News-Chronicle has solemnly editorialized, "No feat is comparable with this since Goliath was laid low by a pebble slung by the boy David."
