In Canby, Mrs. Rickert attended a district Rebekah convention and in Portland she went to the Odd Fellows home. She also visited relatives and friends in Portland.

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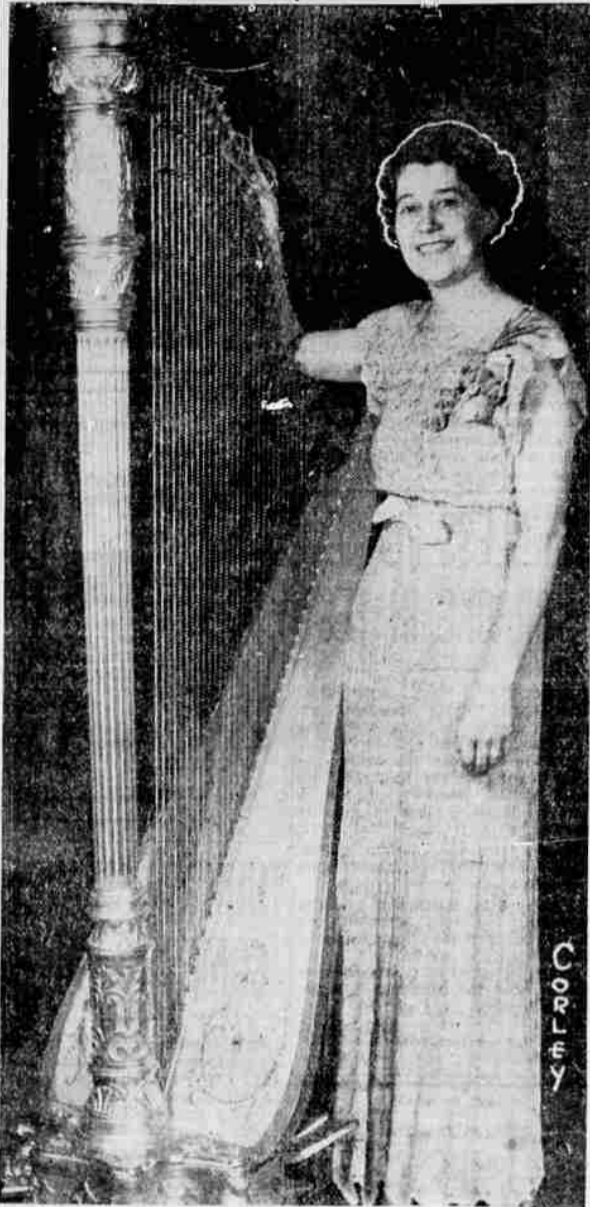
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## Featured Harpist
