'BIG STEEL' PAYS REGULAR DIVIDEND

NEW YORK, April 26.—(AP)—U. S. Steel corporation directors today declared the regular dividend of \$1.75 on the preferred stock.

The corporation paid its remaining arrearage on preferred dividends last August. Subsequently, regular dividends of \$1.75 were declared in October and January. Nothing has been paid on the common since last December when \$1 was ordered, the first since 1932.

No action was taken with respect to common stock. The preferred dividend is payable May 20 to holders of record April 28. Shipments of finished steel products for the first quarter totaled 1,568,244 tons.

CHICAGO, April 26.—(AP)—Tiddy Danielsen, 16-year-old "average" high school boy, was convicted of murder by a criminal court judge today and sentenced to 14 years' imprisonment for fatally stabbing his neighbor in a quarrel over his truncheon.

His father, who had stood by Tiddy during his trial, stepped to the boy's side as Judge Cornelius J. Harrington read the sentence. "Don't hold me, dad; I'm all right," young Danielsen said.

He stood bewildered for a moment, clasping his hands, until a lawyer suggested he take a chair. Tiddy was restless but unpretentious was on his forehead.

In the crowded courtroom was a civic class of girls from Lucy Flower high school. Other high school students had heard the trial. On the witness stand the boy professed inability to remember clearly just what had happened when he killed his mother.

ANTI-SEMITIC MOVE SEEN WITH AUTONOMY. PRAHA, April 26.—(AP)—Fears grew today that if the Sudeten Germans were given local autonomy within Czechoslovakia they would put through anti-semitic measures like those enforced in Germany and recently introduced in Austria.

It was disclosed that published version of the speech made by the nazified Sudeten Germans' leader, Konrad Henlein, at Karlovy Vary Sunday contained only a fraction of what he told his followers. The published version covered only four typewritten pages, but it is known that Henlein spoke for more than an hour.

WALL ST. REPORT

NEW YORK, April 26.—(AP)—A few rats and utilities managed to resist quiet selling in today's stock market, but many leaders ran into losses of fractions to 2 or more points.
