SALESMANSHIP IN LAW ENFORCING IS COP CLASS TOPIC

"Salesmanship in Law Enforcement" was the subject handled by C. C. Spears, ex-special agent for the federal bureau of investigation at the first of a series of four classes in the peace officers training school held in the council chambers of city hall yesterday afternoon.

Spears, fully acquainted with all phases of police work, enumerated 25 principal duties of the police officer, and their relationship to the general public. He also told of the history and development of the F. B. I. A round-table discussion was held, with Spears answering questions and fully explaining many phases of the work.

Thirteen law enforcement officers attended. They were G. W. Hilton, Jacksonville marshal; E. W. Hedgepeth, Central Point chief of police; B. F. Graybill, Grants Pass chief of police; G. M. Dallas, Pete Smith and Ken Williams, all Grants Pass policemen; and the following Medford city policemen: Clyde Fichtner, C. W. Clause, Joe Cave, Walter J. Reiniking, William E. Peck, Dale B. Carr and C. J. Moser.

Next class will be held May 3, with Orville R. Williams, detective of the Portland police bureau, talking on "Analysis of Crimes."
