RUNAWAY SEDAN CATAPULTS INTO SERVICE STATION

Mrs. Mollie Rush, aged Ashland woman, narrowly escaped serious injury when an automobile driven by Benjamin F. Mulkey, 70, retired Eugene attorney, crashed through the front wall of a service station in which she was sitting, shortly after 7 o'clock last night.

The machine catapulted over a cement gasoline-pump island, ripped through the front wall of the building and came to a stop entirely within the station, and only five feet from Mrs. Rush. Although not physically injured, Mrs. Rush suffered nervous shock and was under the care of a physician last night.

The accident occurred at the C. M. Rush service station at 1320 Skaklyou boulevard in Ashland. The entire front of the building was demolished, one gas pump was knocked over and ruined, and interior fixtures of the station damaged.

Mr. and Mrs. Mulkey were uninjured, and their Dodge sedan received only slight damage.

According to investigating state police officers, the Mulkey car, traveling south, apparently went out of control when it encountered ruts alongside the highway, and before the driver could straighten it out it crashed into the station. Mr. Mulkey was not held.

Mrs. Rush, who was alone in the station at the time of the accident, was taken out through a rear window. The car completely blocked the doorway.

JOHNSON ELECTED MODERATOR OVER BAPTISTS' GROUP

ASHLAND, April 29.—(Sp.)—W. A. Johnson of Grants Pass was elected moderator at the annual meeting of the Rogue River Baptist association here Tuesday and Wednesday.

F. O. Carlow, Medford, was elected vice moderator and the Rev. J. C. Orr, Klamath Falls, member of the state board. Medford was chosen for the 1939 convention, to be held on the last Tuesday and Wednesday of April. The Rev. Paul Roper, Brookings, was chosen to give the annual sermon. A one-day meeting will be held in Brookings in September.

In the absence of V. O. N. Smith, moderator, the meeting was called to order Tuesday morning by B. F. Neff, Medford. The Rev. C. E. Dunham gave the opening devotionals.

Letters showing advances in all churches were read to the assembly. W. A. Johnson, Grants Pass, gave an address on "The Christian and His Bible."

Dr. T. H. Hagen, Portland, gave a talk on religious education at the Tuesday session. A fellowship dinner was served at 6 o'clock by the women of the Baptist church in the church basement.

At the evening service, the Rev. J. C. Orr, Klamath Falls, gave the annual sermon. Morning devotionals Wednesday were led by the Rev. W. A. Dawes, Medford. A business session followed at which elections were held. Then a report was given on state missions by the Rev. F. A. Starring, Portland, state convention secretary.

"Baptist Doctrines and Living" was the subject of an afternoon sermon given by the Rev. E. J. Dodson, Miss Mary Ayres, state missionary of Selma, gave an address on "The Outlook of the Rural Church." Special music was provided by Mrs. Don V. Platt, Medford. Dr. F. E. Starring conducted a round-table discussion. Thirty-eight attended from Medford.
