4 bananas
4 cup chopped figs
1 1/4 cup chopped prunes
2 tablespoons raspberry jam
1 tablespoon orange juice
1-3 cup salad dressing
1-3 cup chopped peanuts
Chicory (or lettuce)
Cut bananas in half, lengthwise

Mix figs with prunes, jam and juice and use as filling for banana halves, replacing them to represent whole bananas. Roll the filled bananas in some of the dressing and then in the nuts. Arrange on chicory and top with rest of dressing.

Minted Peas.
3 tablespoons butter
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1-3 teaspoon salt
2 cups cooked peas
1 teaspoon chopped mint
Mix ingredients and allow to simmer for three minutes in a covered pan.
