

ANCIENT FOSSIL BONES PRESERVED, VIEWED BY MANY

The head of the prehistoric animal found Wednesday in the Sterling mine was encased in plaster of Paris for preservation at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

The plaster work was done by John Eliot Allen, geologist, and Ralph Mason, chemist, of the Rustless Mining corporation who were asked to come here from Grants Pass to preserve the skeleton by Dr. Warren D. Smith, professor of geology at the University of Oregon. Dr. Smith plans to come here himself Tuesday or Wednesday, Mr. Allen said.

A. H. Banwell, manager of the chamber of commerce, said that it was likely the fossil would be taken upstate for scientific study and exhibit. Ultimately, however, it will be returned to the Southern Oregon Gem and Mineral society for its projected museum here, he stated.

Mr. Allen said the skeleton, comprising skull and horns, was the remains of an animal of the bog group, related to an extinct species of water buffalo. The animal belonged to the ice or Pleistocene age and might possibly date back 500,000 years, he stated, adding that to speak more authoritatively he would have to examine the deposit in which it was found.

Dr. Winnifred Bradway, head of the science department of the Southern Oregon Normal school in Ashland, also said it appeared to be the remains of a water buffalo. She estimated the age, however, at 40,000 to 50,000 years. In geologic terms, she added, that was not old.

Hundreds of persons viewed the fossil, found 35 feet below the surface, while it was on exhibit at the chamber of commerce. It served to emphasize the value of the Southern Oregon Gem and Mineral society, Mr. Banwell said. It was removed, brought to Medford and treated for preservation by E. R. Santo and William McClure of the mineral society.
