## CHAMPION CHICK TWIRLS 'SECRET' FOR PAY-OFF PIN

Cowboy Dude Chick made the Black Secret's Medford debut highly unpleasant last night in the Medford armory by spinning wrestler's new hooded monster into oblivion in 28 minutes flat before a near-capacity crowd.

It was a copyrighted Chick victory, the junior heavyweight champion giving his opponent a wrestling lesson until the opportunity presented itself for the larist business. And when it came, the Cowboy didn't hesitate. He hoisted the Secret aloft and gave him 14 complete revolutions of the spin, and the masked villain was utterly unable to return for more mat action. It was the lone fall of the match.

Because there had been no agreement between the Secret and Promoter Lillard regarding the hooded one unmasking in case of a defeat, local fans didn't get a glimpse of the face underneath the black head-covering. The Black Secret told Lillard after the match that he wouldn't unmask anyway, and never would.

The masked grappler was previously billed as a clean and scientific performer, but he showed little else but downright ornariness.

Sgt. Bob Kenaston made short work of Bulldog Ken Hollis in the middle event, grabbing falls in the second and third heats with Gold Hill crabs. It was a dirty match until Kenaston applied the finishing touches, with Hollis pulling all the illegal acts in the book, and Kenaston fighting back with the same maneuvers. Kenaston applied his first crab hold near the end of the second round, and so woefully was Hollis that he was easy prey for the same hold within 10 seconds after the third round started.

Bobby Chick took a page from his brother's grappling book in the opening bout to spin the villainous Fritz Hansen into submission in the fourth canto, after the Swede gained the initial tumble in the third round with a Boston crab.

Bobby gave a pretty fair imitation of Dude when he picked Hansen up and revolved him a dozen times before slamming him to the canvas and dropping on top for the fall. Hansen, like the Black Secret, was unable to come back. Brother Bobby's larist spin was slightly different than Dude's, in that he reversed the procedure by hoisting Hansen to his shoulders upside-down.

Promoter Lillard announced that Red Lyons, the Joplin Ghost, would definitely appear on next week's program for the first time since last year.

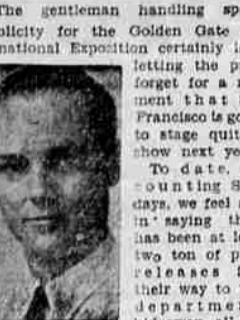

### Golden Gate Fair Planning Colossal Sports Program

The gentleman handling sports publicity for the Golden Gate International Exposition certainly isn't letting the press forget for a moment that San Francisco is going to stage quite a show next year.

To date, not counting Sundays, we feel safe in saying there has been at least two ton of press releases find their way to this department's highway, all extolling and halcyoning the stupendous and colossal events, which will take place on or near Treasure Island. Laid end to end, the sheets of nice white paper would probably reach from the Perry building to Joe DiMaggio's bannery in North Beach.

From the looks of this reading matter released from exposition headquarters, we would predict that "Frisco is going to come through with a sports program that'll make the Olympic games look like a Sunday school picnic."

This last batch of releases to suddenly appear on the typing gadget of yours truly is a mere three pages, and hushed up into sports "fillers."

First item is in regard to the plaque and individual medals to be awarded the first six teams to finish in a three and a half mile relay swim around Treasure Island, May 15.

Then follows two short briefs of not much import. The next "filler" states that "Paul 'Hardrock' Simpson, whose jetterhead proclaims him a world champion runner, insists in a letter to the 1938 World's Fair of the West that it cannot be complete without a marathon, and a 24-hour race against a horse, for which 'Hardrock' holds several records."

The release makes it clear that such an event will probably be arranged.

The fair will go in a big way for aquatic events of all kinds and descriptions. There will be boat and canoe racing, Sea Scout activities, canoe tilting, diving and swimming exhibitions, a huge yacht regatta, and almost anything else you can think of, which has to do with water sports.

There is no doubt but that those in charge of the program believe it will be positively terrific, which is probably true. In fact, one "filler" even goes so far as to announce that southern California sportsmen will cooperate in athletic events, which is certainly being optimistic.

Heretofore, about the only cooperation between San Francisco and the southern part of the state has been of the cut-throat variety.

Among coming sports events in Medford, of more than passing importance, is the first annual Medford Regional Small Bore Matches to be staged by the Medford Rifle club, May 29 and 30, at the club's range on the property of S. M. Tuttle near Table Rock. It will be a National Rifle association registered tournament, and already entries have been received from all parts of Oregon and northern California, as far south as Fresno, Cal.

## Catfish Derby On May 15 To Be Bigger and Better Showing of Anglers' Art

With all major plans completed, green light signals were turned on today for the second annual national cat fish derby at Emigrant lake near Ashland, on Sunday, May 15.

The classic of the nation's angling contests will be bigger and better than it was last year, many features to be added this season for the entertainment of spectators during the fishing competition, it was declared by Frank Peri, president of the National Catfish Derby association.

The catfish contest itself will be held from 2 to 4 p. m. under the same rules that prevailed last year. Teams must be composed of three members, men or women, and there will be a variety of prizes for winners in a number of classifications.

As before, first team prize will be a handsome gold cup.

Opening event of the afternoon celebration will be the crowning of the Queen of the Derby at 1:45. Mayors of several southern Oregon cities will take part in the crowning ceremony.

During the fishing contest a variety of entertainment features will be held for the benefit of the large crowd of spectators that is anticipated. In charge of George Hunt, the famed cinema impresario, the program will include a badger fight and greased pig and greased pole contests. All of the entertainment and side contests will be of an old-fashioned nature in keeping with today's trends and there will be something to engage the interest of all, young and old, Mr. Hunt said. There will be prizes for all contest winners, he added.

"A great deal of interest in cities as distant as Crescent City, Roseburg, Marshfield and Klamath Falls has already been shown in the derby and we expect a record number of contestants as well as spectators," President Peri said. "Our first annual catfish derby brought valuable publicity to the Rogue river valley and this year we hope to get even better results. To this end we need the cooperation of the public. Plan now to attend the derby. It will be worth taking in. It is all free and it is all good fun, good entertainment."

"Last year, on a cold, rainy, disagreeable Sunday, 2500 spectators attended our first catfish derby. This year let us make it at least 5,000."

## Star of Indianapolis Race Grooming New \$16,000 Car

LOS ANGELES, May 3.—(AP)—Speed Merchant Lou Meyer, greases his hands and a wry grin on his face, toasted with black coffee today the new \$16,000 mechanical mount he hopes will carry him to his fourth victory at Indianapolis on Memorial Day.

It isn't quite ready yet, this bullet-nosed racer of shining metal, but Meyer and his assistants are working day and night in a little hideaway machine shop so they can take it east by the end of the week.

Ever since last August, they've been working on it. It's brand new from stem to stern. At a test spin on Murco dry lake a week ago, Meyer said he got up to 130 miles an hour.

Then he brought it back to Fred Offenhouse's shop and tore it down for another of the almost endless series of checkups.

Meyer is glad the Indianapolis officials have rescinded the ban on superchargers, for he believes small motors supercharged are more efficient and faster than big motors without "blower" attachment. His new machine turns up 35,000 revolutions a minute.

For financial backer, he has Bob Beew, Indianapolis sportsman and no expense has been spared in developing the machine, he said.

Meyer first broke into the Indianapolis record books in 1927, driving relief for the winner, Wilbur Shaw. Since then, he's won three times, finished second once, and fourth twice.

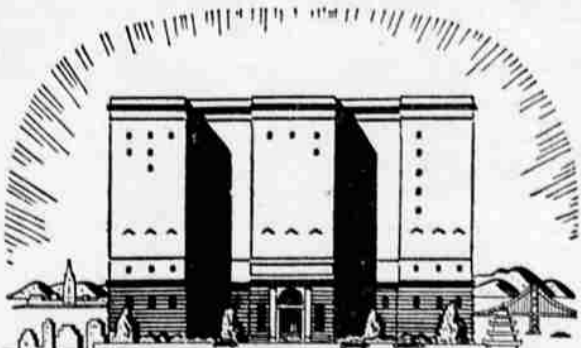
