

SPRAGUE TO TALK HERE TOMORROW; HESS PAYS VISIT

GOP Primary Candidate for Governor to Be Speaker at Medford Luncheon—Campaigning Intensified

With the primary date drawing near, state and national candidates have been intensifying their campaigns and aspirants to public office have been concentrating on southern Oregon in the past few days.

Closely following yesterday's visit of Gov. Charles H. Martin, Charles A. Sprague, Republican primary candidate for governor, will be guest of honor at a luncheon in Valentine's cafe at noon tomorrow. Anyone interested in hearing him is invited to be present.

Mr. Sprague is scheduled to arrive this afternoon in Grants Pass, where at 6:30 he will address a dinner-meeting in the Hotel Del Rogue. Tomorrow morning he will spend in Ashland, coming to Medford for the luncheon.

Newspaper Publisher.

Mr. Sprague has been publisher of the Oregon Statesman in Salem since 1929. Prior to that he was business manager of the Corvallis Gazette-Times from 1925 to 1929. He is a trustee of Willamette university and of Albany college.

Mr. Sprague was born in Lawrence, Kan., November 12, 1887. He studied at Monmouth college, Illinois, where he received a B.A. degree in 1910. He was assistant superintendent of public instruction in Washington from 1913 to 1915. He has been in Oregon since 1925.

While Governor Martin was addressing a large audience in the Hotel Medford yesterday, Henry Hess, his primary opponent, was conferring with party and labor leaders here. To avoid a conflict with the governor's appearance, he gave no public address in Medford. He spoke last night in Grants Pass. He lives in LaGrande and has been a state senator.

Fights for Masses.
Mr. Hess was accompanied here by State Senator Byron G. Carney of Clackamas county, W. L. Norvell of Portland and Vernon Bull, state representative from Union county.

Mr. Hess is 47 years old and the father of two boys. He was reared on a farm and in lumber camps. He has practiced law for 20 years and during his five sessions in the state senate he became known as an aggressive protagonist for the masses.

NATION'S OLDEST OAK DIES IN 650TH YEAR

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., May 4.—(AP)—The nation's oldest oak tree, the 650-year-old great white oak of Mingo, apparently is dead, State Forester D. B. Griffin reported today. Leaves failed to come out this year for the first time. The oak is 145 feet tall and has a girth of 30 feet at the base.

CORVALLIS FROSH TO BALLOT AGAIN

CORVALLIS, May 4.—(AP)—While senior class factions battled the hatchet, the freshmen injected new zest into politics on the Oregon State College campus today by deciding to throw out the next election for a president for next year's sophomore class and do it all over again.

The decision came after a recheck showed that one junior had voted in the first year students' election, inasmuch as Frank Chown beat Bob Robinson, both of Portland, by a vote, 110 to 109, the students agreed to ballot again.

The second phase of one of the most hectic political seasons of campus history—the dispute over the senior presidency—came to a peaceful conclusion with student leaders deciding to forget their differences and unite in support of Bob Walker, Portland, who defeated Ed Burchell, Lexington, by a 25-vote majority.

In the senior election one over-enthusiastic vote counter was caught marking a ballot upon which a voter had failed to designate a choice for president. A recount followed and Walker won.

**GOLD HILL TO HAVE
SPECIAL AIR CACHET**
GOLD HILL, May 4.—(AP)—The city council is cooperating with Postmaster H. D. Force in sponsoring a cachet during National Air Mail week, May 15 to 21.

Contemplated design for the special stamp will advertise the recreational facilities of Gold Hill. The center design will consist of a salmon leaping from the water with the lettering underneath "On the Banks of the Rogue."

On the other side of the design will be lettered "Gold Hill," and on the opposite side, "Oregon." Across the top of the stamp will appear "National Air Mail Week, May 15-21."

CHURCH LEADERS ARE INTRODUCED AT CONFERENCE

Distinguished Guests Welcomed at Nazarene Assembly—General Superintendent Delivers Message

Last night at the formal opening of the Nazarene church, Fred M. Weatherford, host pastor, introduced a number of distinguished guests, representatives of the denomination as general officers with headquarters in Kansas City, Mo., including: Dr. J. G. Morrison, general superintendent; Dr. C. Warren Jones, general foreign missionary secretary; Dr. E. J. Fleming, general secretary; P. H. Lund, associate manager of the publicity of the Nazarene church; and Rev. E. E. Martin, North Pacific district superintendent.

The host pastor also welcomed the delegations on behalf of the local church and introduced Mayor T. S. Wiley, of Ashland, who welcomed the visitors to southern Oregon. Dr. Sherman L. Divine, president of the Medford Ministerial association, welcomed the guests on behalf of the churches in Medford, who have opened their homes to assist in entertaining the delegations.

Rev. E. E. Martin officially introduced the speaker of the hour, Dr. J. G. Morrison, who delivered an inspiring message from a chapter in his life story, as a frontier boy living in a sod house in the Dakotas. He told the audience, of some 700 people, which taxed the seating, of the Nazarene, how he found Jesus Christ as his personal savior and the blessing of God's sanctifying grace.

Dr. Henry B. Wallin, pastor of the First Church of the Nazarene in Los Angeles arrived this morning to conduct the evangelistic series throughout remaining days of the conference. Dr. Wallin, rated as among the most able ministers of today, will speak each night at 7:30.

Some 60 ministers of the denomination, comprising the North Pacific district, reported today on their ministry throughout the year. The reports indicate that the district has experienced an increase of approximately 500 new communicants and that budgets have virtually all been met in full. The district has given more than \$6000 to foreign missions.

One of the outstanding characters attending assembly is Dr. H. D. Brown, of Seattle, who, with his long flowing beard and massive physique, takes the form of one of the old patriots. Approaching his 92nd birthday, his mind is clear and alert. He was prominent in the discussions in the assembly today. He was the first district superintendent of the North-western area church of the Nazarene, more than 30 years ago.

Tonight, at 8:30, Dr. Russell V. DeLong, president of the Northwest Nazarene College, will address a group, which will organize a district training guild, with objective of better teaching in Sunday schools.

Dr. J. G. Morrison, who addressed the assembly this morning on "The Spirit of Christian Love" will address the assembly each morning at 8:30. The public is invited to the day sessions, as well as the night.

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Low Priced Auto With Rear Drive Promised World

NEW YORK, May 4.—(AP)—The World-Telegram says Emile E. C. Mathis, French motor manufacturer, today confirmed reports that he and Alex Wenner-Pren, Swedish industrialist, were planning a new type of automobile powered by a radial motor in the rear and designed to sell for \$300 or less.

Tentative plans call for manufacture of the car in France, England, Sweden and the United States, with the American plant to be located near New York. Mathis said the car was designed to go 50 to 60 miles on a gallon of gasoline, and that the motor would have seven, eight or nine cylinders. Maximum speed, he said, would be about 80 miles per hour.

ART STUDY PLAN UNDERGOES TRIAL IN SCHOOLROOMS

Art Teachers in Selected Schools of State Test Course for Permanent Use—Plan Exhibit May 14

SOUTHERN OREGON STATE NORMAL SCHOOL, Ashland, May 4.—(Sp.)—A course of study in art, which may be adopted for use in the public schools of Oregon, is being planned by a committee selected by the state department of education, with Miss Lucile Burris of the Normal school art department selecting the suggested art projects, and Mrs. Una B. Inch Jackson county rural supervisor, general committee chairman.

Miss Burris has chosen a number of units, including proportion, animal study and the child's own creative expression. Each unit is divided into appreciation, composition and design. An attempt has been made to adapt the various units to the problems encountered in the different types of schools—the one-room rural school, the small graded school and town and city school.

Tested in Schools
This course of study as outlined by Miss Burris is being sent to a committee composed of art teachers in selected schools over the state, who are using it in actual practice in their art classes. After its practicability in the classroom has been established it will be adopted for permanent use.

The Jackson county committee of art teachers to whom the units have been sent includes Miss Linda Wright of Antelope school, Mrs. Opal Mooter of Reese Creek school, Miss Joyce Handley and Miss Elsie Strauss of Gold Hill, Mrs. Bertha Haskins of

Beaver Creek school Mrs. Clara Goldin of Phoenix, Mr. Melvin Smith of Table Rock school, Miss Eleanor Curry of Medford, Miss Alice Kettle of Ashland, Miss Harriet Pellett of Prospect, Mrs. Cora Gustin of Derby school and Miss Marjorie Gregory of Central Point.

To Aid Selection
The purpose of this tentative art program is to aid the teacher in selecting art problems appropriate for the various seasons; to proportion art activities to the course as varied and inclusive; to give a broad enough program to allow for choice of problems as well as for adaptation to varying conditions and needs.

An exhibit of the work of school children in carrying out this art program will be shown at the Normal school on May 14.

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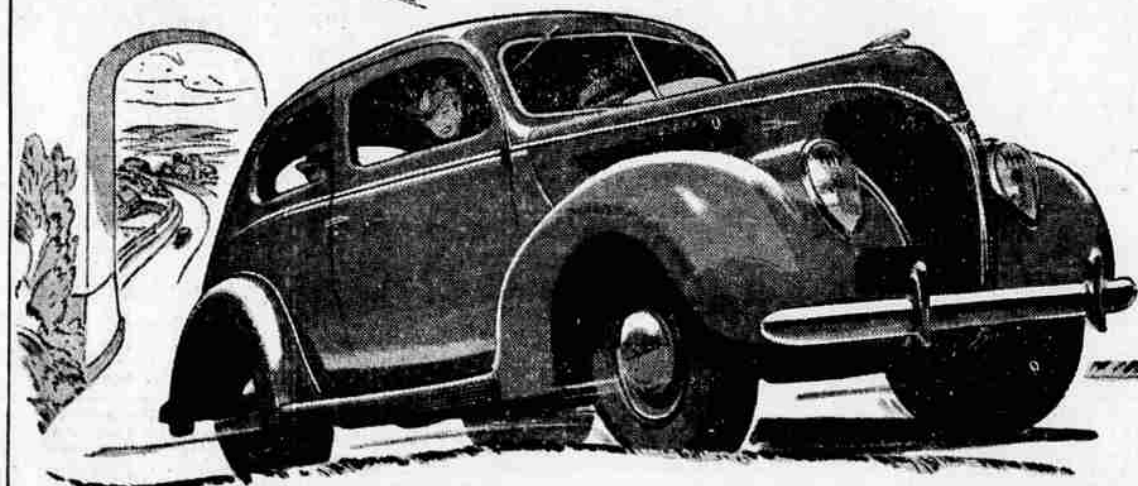
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
