

# BUILDING UPTURN IS FOUND HERE BY LOAN BANK AIDE

There is a decided upturn in home building in Medford today and the substantial progress of this city is further pointed out by the rapid growth in numbers and amounts of investment accounts in the federal savings and loan associations here, commented W. C. Kaley, assistant to the president of the Federal Home Loan bank of Portland, who is here visiting the local associations.

Kaley reports that federal savings and loan associations throughout the country are attracting large investment share accounts as well as new monthly savings and that the many new share accounts in the local institutions vary in type, large and small, which is a healthy sign. It shows that with the accounts of each individual insured up to \$5,000 and with the Federal Home Loan bank, of which the local institutions are members, supplying a reservoir of reserves, savers are very much interested in placing their savings in their home institutions.

New money is flowing into these associations from all sources, as those who put in money know that it is insured by an instrumentality of the federal government and that there is always a large reserve of money available for share investors should it be needed, he asserted.

Guaranteed safety and reasonable liquidity are the things about which the investor wants to know, and knowing these things, is most anxious to have his money remain at home to help in the upbuilding of his community from which he receives his livelihood, Kaley stated.

Through this cooperative thrift and home building plan, local money goes to meet the requirements of the local borrower. Home institutions, keeping the money circulating in local channels, naturally appeal to all alike—building permanent wealth and increasing payroll dollars that in turn flow to all lines of local business, Kaley said.

There are 12 Federal Home Loan banks in the United States. The Portland bank serves the 11th district comprising Alaska, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Washington and Wyoming. These banks form a tremendous reservoir of capital, ready at all times to supply funds to its members, such as the Jackson County Federal and the First Federal Savings and Loan associations of Medford, that they in turn may meet the requirements of share investors, Kaley said.

No money is loaned to individuals but to association members who deal directly with the public. Savings and loan associations lend their money on first mortgages to be amortized over a long period, so should share investors find need for a portion of their savings the associations would meet the requirements through their memberships with the bank, he remarked.

# MEN BEHIND GUN WANT HIGHER PAY

WASHINGTON, May 6. — (AP) — A spokesman for "the man behind the gun"—the enlisted man in the army, navy, marine corps and coast guard—asked congress today to increase enlisted pay as part of the national defense program.

J. E. Nieman, appearing for the regular veterans' association, said service men "still serve under a horse and buggy pay scale," with the \$21 monthly base pay of 75,000,000 army privates and marines \$9 under the monthly scale for CCC enrollees. He urged a pay scale ranging from \$39 up to \$150 a month. The present range is \$21 to \$130.

He estimated the pay increases would cost about \$65,000,000 annually.

# 'CLIVEDEN SET' MYTH SAY LORD, LADY ASTOR

LONDON, May 5. — (AP) — Lord Astor and his Virginia-born wife say the "Cliveden set" is a myth.

In letters published today by two London newspapers of different political viewpoint, they blamed English communist publications for circulating stories of pro-fascist gatherings at their Thames side estate, Cliveden.

Both said they were in the United States and that Cliveden was closed in January at the time when "communist leaflets" charged a meeting was held there and that it influenced subsequent changes in British policy.

# Soil Erosion Held Tooth Decay Cause

PHILADELPHIA, May 6. — (AP) — Delegates to the annual convention of the Pennsylvania Dental society were told today that soil erosion was indirectly responsible for increased tooth decay among the American people.

Plants growing on impoverished soil, said Dr. Fred Miller, president of the society, are deficient in calcium, phosphorus and other minerals necessary for sound teeth.

He said that certain foods were robbed of additional ingredients by modern refining processes.

# NITRO BAD ACTOR, RIFLEMAN FINDS

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — The police weren't quite so nonchalant as their bungler-prisoner had been with his nitroglycerin.

When he was arrested after he blew open a drug store safe he carried an ounce bottle of the explosive in his hip pocket.

Gingerly taking it from him, the police explosive experts packed the bottle in a bucket of snow and carried it to an isolated hillside. There the bottle was removed and placed on an old rusted stove as a target for Patrolman Invald Young, expert rifleman.

Young retired as far as the range of his rifle would permit and then fired one shot.

"It appeared as though about half the hillside blew up," Young said. "The mountain shook. Try as we might, we were unable to find one piece of that stove that we could identify as such."

Explosive experts said the heat from the burglar's body was sufficient to have set off the nitroglycerin.

"Dust Bowl Lister" MOLINE, Ill. (UP) — A machine known as a damming lister, developed to aid "dust bowl" farmers in their battle against wind erosion of top soil, is being tested here. It deeply furrows a field and at intervals scoops up a quantity of soil and deposits it in the trench to form a dam.

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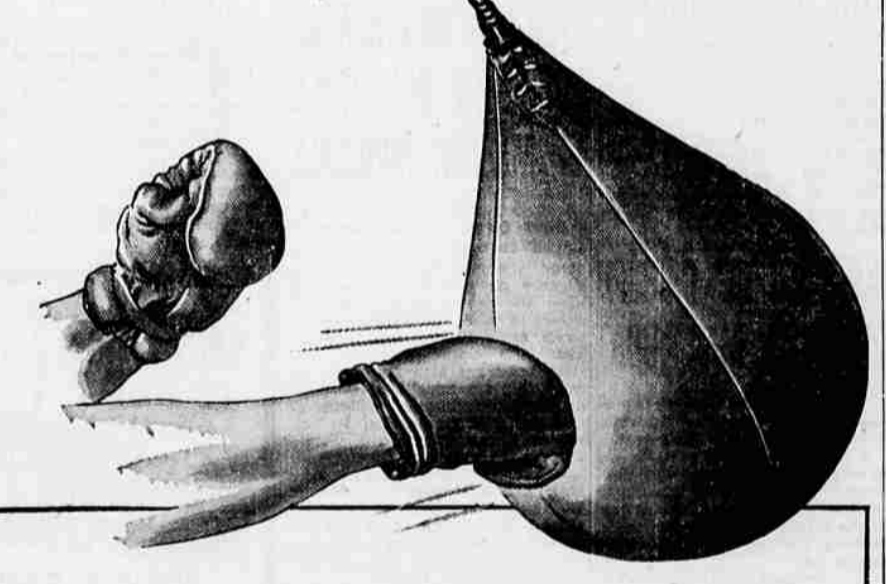
