

### ROLLO PLANS TO FILE GUILTY PLEA ON PROWL CHARGE

#### Posed As Probable Purchaser Of Orchard—Clings To Chinese War Service Claim.

Ronald Rollo, 39, alias John Zwick, who allegedly confessed to the robbery of 12 Medford homes since April 18, waived preliminary hearing in justice of the peace court yesterday morning and was bound over to the grand jury on \$2000 bail.

Deputy District Attorney George Neilson quoted Rollo as saying he would waive grand jury rights and go before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton on a district attorney's information Monday to plead guilty. He is charged with larceny from a dwelling.

The dapper, polished, fast-talking Rollo, who claims he was an aerial machine-gunner for the Chinese in the current Oriental war and who was in Medford purportedly for the purpose of purchasing a large fruit orchard, was arrested by City Police-men Clyde Pichtner and Ray Stoneker Thursday night. Under questioning at city police station, he admitted entering a dozen local residences, Chief of Police Clatous McCredie said, obtaining clothing, jewelry and miscellaneous articles valued at approximately \$500.

In justice of the peace court yesterday, Rollo stuck to his story of having been a machine-gunner for the Chinese, and of receiving machine-gun wounds in his leg when his plane was forced down. In his short term of freedom in Medford, Rollo was taken on tours of the valley by citizens interested in selling him a pear orchard. When arrested he had only 75 cents on his person, although he reportedly asserted he had \$16,000 cash with which to buy an orchard.

Although Rollo admits to city police of having robbed only two other houses before coming to Medford, they being in Portland, Chief McCredie said he was investigating, through fingerprints, the possibility that Rollo had a previous crime record. Prints of him have been sent to Salem.

### STATE CHAMPION BAND NEEDS \$500 FOR SEATTLE TRIP

#### High School Hopes To Enter Regional Contest—Concert Tuesday To Help Raise Fund.

"On to Seattle" is the slogan of the Medford high school state championship band as it gets ready for the final concert to be given Tuesday night at the school auditorium to finance the Seattle trip.

The band has been invited by the University of Washington to compete in the regional contest as the state of Oregon champions in "B" class. For the first time in years Medford came out of the championship contest the winner.

Five hundred dollars must be raised to make the trip possible. A committee of downtown business men has been appointed through the chamber of commerce to act as advisors to the campaign, and to help raise the money.

The concert Tuesday night will commence at 8 and will feature classical, martial, and modern music, along with the presentation of brilliant young soloists, four of whom won first places in the state contest at Corvallis last month.

Tickets may be bought at either the chamber of commerce or the senior high school.

Band members themselves will contribute the balance necessary to finance the trip. Expenses, however, will be held to a minimum by board members of downtown fraternities and sororities on the Washington campus.

According to Wilson F. Wait, director, the concert Tuesday will be the best ever presented in Medford. He urges everyone to attend, not only to give the band the necessary funds, but to enjoy a splendid concert.

### FOUNDER LIGHT PLANT HERE DEAD

J. C. Baird, credited with establishing the first electric light plant in Medford, died recently in Long Beach, Calif., at the age of 70.

With Creed Stratton, Mr. Baird established an electric light plant here about 1894. After operating it for about five years, the partners sold out to H. H. Whitehead.
