WRITES OBITUARY ERE DEATH DROP

SHANGHAI, May 7.—(AP)—Henry Hufner, city editor of the Shanghai Evening Post, plunged to his death early today from the sixth floor of the navy Y. M. C. A., leaving a self-written obituary for his paper.

Hufner's death came less than 24 hours after that of his 23-year-old fiancee, Violet Ehlth Thompson, who died yesterday after a dental operation.

In his obituary, Hufner said he decided to be "with the one girl he ever loved" and requested their bodies be buried together.

EUGENE UNIONIST GETS JAIL TERM

EUGENE, May 7.—(AP)—Hugh W. Reynolds, secretary-treasurer of the teamsters union local here, was sentenced to one year in the county jail by Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth this morning for his part in labor terrorism activities here last November.

Reynolds was tried and convicted in March on charges of breaking windows in a building not his own. Three Portland youths were hired by Reynolds to do the actual window breaking.

Attorneys for Reynolds, immediately after sentence was passed, filed notice of appeal to the supreme court. Judge Skipworth stated he would grant a certificate of probable cause.

ALBANY, MAY 7.—Linn county appeared headed today toward another election to determine whether it should build a new courthouse.

The voters who approved a new courthouse last fall may have to state themselves once more as a result of the presentation of a petition by J. G. Reed, Lebanon, demanding an election.

Reed's petition, which must be checked against registration lists and assessment rolls to determine whether signers are all property taxpayers, as required by law, was offered at a public hearing upon a proposal to use a surplus of county funds for the courthouse project.

GRANGE POWER ACT GETS VOTE TITLE

SALISBURY, May 7.—(AP)—Ballot title for the proposed Grange initiative measure authorizing peoples' utility districts to incur indebtedness and issue revenue certificates, debentures, notes and warrants, without seeking authority of the voters, was completed by Attorney General Van Winkle today.

The certificates, debentures, notes and warrants would be payable solely from the revenues of the district and the interest rate would be limited to six per cent.

CLACKAMAS ALIEN VOTERS OFF LIST

OREGON CITY, May 7.—(AP)—County Clerk Guy H. Pace was ordered yesterday by District Attorney Fred A. Miller to remove from registration lists the names of four persons he asserted were unqualified voters.

Included were William E. Biggs, president of the Clackamas county central labor council, and Mrs. Daisy, who Miller asserted were Canadians.

The immigration office at Portland supplied sufficient evidence to warrant removal of the names pending a grand jury investigation, Miller told Pace.

Noted Dead

BUCHAREST, Rumania, May 7.—(AP)—Octavian Goga, 57, who headed a nationalist, anti-semitic Rumanian government for a few turbulent weeks early this year, died today.

Goga, who suffered a heart ailment after his resignation as premier, February 10, had a stroke this week.

CORVALLIS, May 7.—(AP)—Dr. Joseph Mason Artman, editor of the magazine, "Character In Every Day Life," will be the speaker at the 49th annual Oregon State college commencement on May 31.

Dr. Oswald W. S. McCall, pastor of the First Congregational church at Berkeley, Calif., will deliver the secularist sermon on May 29.

KIDDLE TO SUPERVISE INSURANCE ON CROPS

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(AP)—Seventeen state supervisors for field administration of the new \$20,000,000 federal wheat crop insurance program were appointed yesterday by the federal crop insurance corporation. Included was Clyde Kiddle, La Grande, supervisor for Oregon.

Kiddle will coordinate work of the agricultural adjustment administration and the corporation in the program.

Supervisors, the corporation said, will work under the direction of state agricultural conservation committees in writing insurance through county associations and with regional offices of the corporation in adjusting losses.
