CCC COMMANDER IS PLEASED WITH MEDFORD SET-UP

Major General Albert J. Bowley, commanding general of the ninth corps area, inspected two CCC camps as well as district headquarters during his visit here yesterday. SEVERAL MAYORS WILL OFFICIATE AT CATFISH FETE

Wiley of Ashland Will Crown Pearl Wisotski As Queen of Derby — Furnas Will Be Derby Starter.

Several mayors are scheduled to officiate at the second annual national catfish derby at Emigrant lake near Ashland Sunday. It was announced today by Frank DeSouza, derby association master of ceremonies.

Mayor T. M. Wiley of Ashland will be the first municipal chief executive to get into action. As mayor of the host city he will crown Pearl Wisotski, Medford girl, as queen of the derby. Medford's own mayor, Charles C. Furnas, will be derby starter, Mayor J. A. Slover of Grants Pass will be chief of the judges and Mayor A. L. Herzog of Yreka, Calif., will be clerk of the course. Prizes will be presented by Mayor Clifton Richmond of Klamath Falls.

Assisting Mayor Slover as judges will be Sheriff A. C. Burk of Marion county, Fred Pick, Ed Lampert and Al Piche.

Although maintaining the contrary, officers of the National Catfish Derby association appeared nettled today over the Southern Oregon Humane society's threat to halt a badger fight scheduled as part of the afternoon's entertainment program. President Frank Peri had lost his usually sunny disposition and noticeably winced when the badger fight was mentioned. Bill Grenbemer, usually most loquacious of the association executives, was stung yesterday that the whole program would be held as planned. President Peri said, a trifle testily, "I meant just what I said. In spite of heaven and high water, the badger fight will be held."

"It is natural for badgers and dogs to fight and there is nothing cruel about anything that's natural. They love to fight; it's fun for them. What is not natural, however, is for animals to perform tricks. That's cruel and if the humane society wants to

do something useful let them stop the circus and the carnival." Come what may, the show is scheduled to start at 1:45 with the crowning of Queen Pearl I. At 2 o'clock the catfish contest will start and will continue to 4. During the contest the program of entertainment for spectator enjoyment will be held. The derby association recommends the Emigrant lake site for a all-day picnic-outing. During the afternoon a concessionaire will be on the grounds to dispense refreshments.
