GYPSIES ACCUSED OF HOLDUP NEAR EAST PARK GATE

KLAMATH FALLS, May 12.—(AP)—Lured to the side of her car by a gypsy woman who cried "Oh, my little girl," Bob H. Chapman, flagman for the Blockliner Lumber company's logging operation, lost \$57 yesterday when another gypsy appeared suddenly and placed a gun in his side, he told Sheriff Lloyd Low.

According to Chapman's story, the stickup occurred on the desolate San creek sector of The Dalles-California highway near the east entrance to Crater Lake park. After robbing Chapman, the gypsies drove quickly off toward the south, their victim said.

Later in the evening Crater Lake park rangers detained Frank and Rosa Evans and their three children at the park entrance, where they were taken in custody by Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon and brought to the county jail here.

Evans and his wife, who officers described as "gypsies," were charged with assault and robbery while armed, but Mattoon said a thorough search of the couple and their car, which carried a South Carolina license, failed to reveal any trace of either gun or money.

POLISH AIRMEN IN TEST FLIGHT

LOS ANGELES, May 12.—(AP)—Five Polish fliers took off at 12:22 P. m. (P. S. T.) today on a test flight to Las Vegas, Nev., in the California-made monoplane which they hope to fly to Warsaw.

Officials at the Union Air terminal, the takeoff point, said the airmen were expected to be back here at 3 p. m. today. Las Vegas is about 250 air miles from here.

The quintet expects to take off on the first leg of the homeward flight at dawn tomorrow.

Major Wacław Makowski, head of the Polish L. O. T. airlines and leader of the expedition, said local technicalities had been smoothed out on the proposed route through South America and French West Africa.
