

U. S. ORDERS CRUISER TO PROTECT CITIZENS IN SEIZED AMOY CITY

HONGKONG, May 12.—(AP)—The United States navy today prepared to send a cruiser and the commander of its south China patrol to Amoy, where the United States gunboat Asheville is standing by for protection of American residents.

Dispatches from Amoy reported the Japanese in virtually complete possession of the native city of Amoy, following collapse of Chinese resistance. Small, isolated groups of Chinese were reported still fighting, however.

Kalangu Island, the international settlement in which nearly all Amoy Americans live, was safe and free from fighting, although the influx of some 50,000 panicky Chinese from

WALLACE REVIEWS UTILITY SAVINGS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12.—(AP)—N. G. Wallace, state public utilities commissioner, said in a radio address last night utility customers had saved \$1,185,240 annually under Governor Charles Martin's administration.

He said rate reductions amounted to \$40,195 in electric charges, \$161,702 in telegraph and telephone, \$36,400 in gas and \$40,942 in steam heating.

The cost of administering the utilities department declined \$83,000 in the last year, Wallace asserted, while the motor transportation section turned in revenue of more than \$825,000 above the department's expenses.

UNCLE SAM GIVEN SHARE OF ESTATE

DENVER, Colo., May 12.—(UP)—Ernest Morris, prominent Denver attorney who died last January, left the United States government, \$505 for the privilege of living under its democratic system.

His widow, Mrs. Lillian E. Morris, who is also executrix of the estate, today forwarded a check to Washington for the amount specified in her husband's will. Other bequests were made to the state of Colorado and the city of Denver.

In stating his reasons for the strange bequests, Morris will read: "In token of deep appreciation of the benefits enjoyed by myself and family of enlightened democratic government under the blessing of the constitution, I give and bequeath \$505 to the U. S. government, \$505 to the state of Colorado and \$255 to the city and county of Denver and release a \$250 claim for legal services rendered the city."

The attorney also left bequests to the University of Colorado and several hospitals and charities in this area. The balance of his \$40,000 estate was shared by Mrs. Morris and two sons.
