

FISHERMEN TAKE MANY SALMON IN G. PASS WATERS

With chinook salmon already being landed by the dozen every day in Rogue river, anglers can look for even better sport for awhile, according to word received from Rainbow Gibson. In a telegram to the Mail Tribune late yesterday, Gibson reported "another run of salmon in at the Savage Rapids dam."

Although many of the big boys are being hooked at or near the dam, many fishermen claim excellent catches in the river below Grants Pass. Dr. and Mrs. Jarrett P. Bray of Medford, fishing at Savage Rapids yesterday, reported eight salmon were landed. Mrs. Bray hooked a large one and when Dr. Bray helped her land it, his finger caught in the tackle and was badly injured. Thirty-five salmon were reported caught Wednesday at Hilton's, and before 8 a. m. Thursday, three anglers landed the limit along the same stretch of river. Thursday morning, Johnny Clarno of Grants Pass brought to gaff near the fairgrounds a 16-pounder bearing fresh marks from water, it apparently having escaped a few hours previous. Largest fish weighed in at Grants Pass Wednesday was landed by Roscoe Baden of Wilderville. It tipped the beam at 27 pounds 8 ounces.

JEFF HIGH SPRINTER SETS STATE RECORD

PORTLAND, May 13.—(AP)—Wesley Steele, Jefferson high school sprint star, shattered city meet and state records for the 440-yard dash yesterday when he ran the distance in 1:12. The previous city record was 52.0, set by Bill Eggleston last year for Franklin. The state mark, set by Schriver of Jefferson in 1934, was 51.5.

Despite Steele's performance, his team finished a poor second to Grant in the intra-city track meet. Grant scored 64 1-3 points, Jefferson 29 and Washington 25. Five meet records fell.

JENNE CONFIRMED AS ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Jenne, head coach and instructor at Washington high school, was officially confirmed yesterday as director of physical education for the Portland school district by the district board. CHINOOKS GOING OVER BONNEVILLE IN DROVES

PORTLAND, May 13.—(AP)—Spring chinook salmon are passing over Bonneville dam fishways at the rate of 1,000 a day. Dr. Willis H. Rich, ichthyologist and director of research for the state fish commission, said yesterday. "All I can say is that the ladders are working admirably," he declared, "and that they are passing fish into the upper river. The prospects are that the run will increase in volume shortly. I can't tell whether the present fish represent the main run or whether they are merely the vanguard of the main run."

Rice Cakes
2 cups boiled rice
2 egg yolks
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
4 tablespoons flour
4 tablespoons fat
Mix rice with yolks and seasonings. Shape into cakes about one inch thick. Roll in flour and brown in fat melted in a frying pan. Serve hot, surrounded with hard-cooked egg slices which have been added to a savory cream sauce. Garnish with parsley.

Fresh Vegetable Salad
1 cup sliced tomatoes
1/4 cup sliced cooked asparagus
1/2 cup sliced cooked carrots
1/2 cup sliced radishes
1/4 cup sliced green peppers (optional)
3 tablespoons sliced onions
1/4 teaspoon salt
1-8 cup French dressing
1/2 cup cream
Mix and chill ingredients. Stir several times and serve in a bowl.
Orange Cream Pie
1 baked pie crust
2-3 cup granulated sugar
1-3 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup orange juice
1/4 cup lemon juice
1/4 cup water
2 eggs
2 tablespoons butter
1-3 teaspoon grated orange rind
1/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 cup whipped cream
Blend sugar with flour and salt. Add juices and water. Add eggs and cook until thick and creamy in a double boiler. Add butter and rinds. Pour into crust. Cool. Top with cream and serve.

JACKSON SCHOOL AUDITORIUM WILL BE READY IN JUNE

With the completion in June of the 90 by 55-foot brick building at Jackson school, under construction since last fall, every grade school in Medford will have excellent gymnasium and auditorium facilities. Lincoln, Washington and Roosevelt already have fine buildings. The Jackson school building is being constructed from brick that has been in storage ever since the old junior high school was dismantled. City School Superintendent E. H. Hedrick said today. Work is being done under the school district's supervision and largely by the district's own men. Foreman is Rosa Dickey. The building will include the auditorium and gymnasium, with the former seating 400 and playing floor of the latter being 65 by 55 feet in size. Also there will be three classrooms and a shop room and a 40 by 25-foot basement. The building will be steam heated by blower units from the main building. There will be a large stage in the auditorium and boys and girls dressing rooms and showers in the basement. Interior will be plastered. Brick contractor is Clem Childers, and plaster contractor is G. A. Sherk.

Orders For Pine Sharply Reduced

PORTLAND, May 13.—(AP)—Reports from 123 mills showed last week's new business reached 61,289,000 board feet of lumber, a decline of 4 1/2 percent since the previous week. The Western Pine association said today. Production totaled 56,918,000 feet, a gain of more than 5,000,000 feet since the previous week, and shipments amounted to 58,582,000 feet, a similar increase. Orders, shipments and production were sharply under the corresponding week of a year ago. To date orders were reported 23 percent below 1932.
