

# Tigers Easily Capture District Track Meet Honors; Pelicans Second

## LOCALS QUALIFY 12 ATHLETES FOR CORVALLIS MEET

### Half Mile Relay Provides Thrills — Central Point Finishes Fourth—Bowerman Squad Strong.

Medford high school's track and field team crushed all opposition yesterday at the stadium to win the annual southern Oregon district meet with 72 points and qualify 12 athletes for the Oregon state championships in Corvallis next Saturday. The Tigers won seven events and picked up many more points in seconds, thirds, fourths and fifths.

Klamath Falls was second with 34 points, Lakeview was third with 15, and Central Point fourth with 14. Other teams and their points were: Clifton, 12 1/2; Grants Pass 12; Myrtle Point 11 1/2; Keno 9; Brookings 8; Malin 7; Phoenix 6; Ashland 5; Jacksonville 3; and Eagle Point 1.

In piling up six dozen points, the most to be scored in the annual affair in three years, Medford assured itself of a powerful entry in the state championships, won last year by Bend. Last season the Tigers qualified only seven performers for the meet.

There was no individual star in yesterday's carnival, no athlete winning more than one first place. Blise O'Connor, Central Point star, won the javelin and placed second in the shot-put; Curry of Lakeview won the 220 and placed second in the 100; and Luther of Medford won the high hurdles and finished second in the low hurdles. Don Cato, Ashland, finished the century in 10:1. There were no exceptional marks turned in, although the track was fast and dry.

Most spectacular race was the half-mile relay, won by Medford in the good time of 1:36. Curry of Lakeview, behind 20 yards as the last 220 yards began, almost slipped Medford's Ray Crosby at the tape. In the high jump, Medford's Don Horner and Jackson of Grants Pass waged a thrilling duel, both going over the bar at 5 feet 10 1/2 inches and falling to make 11 feet. Horner won the event because Jackson had more misses.

Medford performers qualifying for the state meet were Chris Barker in the mile, Horner in the high jump, Bob Verblek in the 440-yard dash, Bob Newland and Martin Luther in the low hurdles, Ray Johnson in the 220-yard dash, Louis Thurman in the javelin, Russ Werner in the half-mile, Bob Eittinger and Chick Finch in the broad jump, Luther in the high hurdles, and the relay team of Eittinger, Verblek, Finch and Crosby.

Cato of Ashland and Curry of Lakeview qualified in the 100-yard dash. Other qualifiers were Baumgartner of Brookings in the mile, Jackson of Grants Pass in the high jump, Hooton of Klamath Falls in the 440-yard dash, Curry of Lakeview in the 220, B. O'Connor of Central Point in the javelin, Smith of Klamath Falls in the half-mile, Christy of Clifton in the shot-put, Rice of Clifton and White of Brookings in the pole vault, Huff of Klamath Falls and Putman of Grants Pass in the discus, Victorine of Malin in the high hurdles and the Lakeview relay team. All winners and runners-up earned the right to enter the state meet.

Bain or shine, snow or hail, moon eclipse or sun eclipse, the second annual catfish derby will be staged at Emigrant lake at 1:45 this afternoon.

For the great sports event last night were the officers and executive committee of the National Catfish Derby association, queen of the derby and her court, the mayors who will officiate, the well-trained dog and hatter who will endeavor to tear each other asunder, the candidates for public office who will try to capture votes by telling winning fish yarns and the contestants themselves.

Even the catfish were ready. Undercover agents viewed Emigrant lake from ambush all day yesterday and noted a score of men and boys working at the angling art.

The catfish, seemingly eager to put on a good show themselves, were rising to the occasion and the lure and getting themselves caught in large numbers, the anglers reported. The names of the fishermen and their catches were recorded in an effort to prevent skulduggery today. None of the catfish landed yesterday will be allowed to figure in today's score.

Herb Brown of the 20-30 club spent yesterday afternoon fixing up a float on which the coronation ceremony will be held. With the event staged on the lake, spectators spread out on the sloping hills, will have an excellent view. A loud-speaker system will keep them informed of everything that goes on.

Emigrant lake is close to the old Pacific highway a short distance this side of the Klamath Falls junction. It is about five miles below the southern Oregon Normal school. At the lake there is parking space for 3,000 cars.

Queen of the derby is blonde, beautiful Pearl Wosotaki. Members of her court are Lucien Clement, prince consort; Laurine Hugger, crown princess; Johnny Wilkinson, crown prince; Princesses Elise Older, June Keen, Barbara Bevan and Joan Buchter; Princes Merlin Dow, Stanley Gustin, Warren Holbrook and Jack Moran; Hugh Williams, royal herald; Betty Crow and Mary Mae Currin, train bearers; and Jerry Dyne, crown bearer.

The royal court is composed of pupils of the Eye Benson dance studio. They are all to meet at the studio at 12:45.

Coronation of the queen will take place at 1:45. At 2 o'clock the catfish contest will start. It will end at 4. During the two hours of competition, various features will be staged to entertain the spectators.

The whole show is free and the public is invited.

BOSTON, May 14.—(AP)—Jimmy Foxx topped off a wild-bitting ball game today with a long-range homer into the center-field bleachers in the eleventh inning that gave the Red Sox a 10 to 9 win over the Washington Senators and boosted the Sox into first place in the American league.

Overcoming the Nats' early lead, which had been compiled by Old Man Al Simmons, who clouted two homers, a triple and a single and drove in six runs, the Sox tied the ball game with a three-run outburst in the ninth and won out in the second extra frame on Jimmy's jolt.

The victory climaxed a triumphant week-long drive by Tom Sawyer's sold-plated hose, stretched that winning streak to seven straight, and bounced the Senators out of the league lead by half a game.

Six homers were hit altogether. In addition to Foxx and Simmons, Gene Desautels, the Sox catcher, Joe Vosmik, their outfielder, and Joe Cronin, their shortstop-manager, each parked one out of the lot.

## MEDFORD BATTLES DUCKS TRACKMEN IN FINISH BOUT

### Justice On Mound, Constable Catching, Sheriff Batting For Start—Record Crowd Expected.

PREHALL BILL Coleman, a husky righthander with a nasty hook, will take the mound shortly before 2:30 this afternoon, and after he attempts to breeze one past the large figure of Slugger Syd Brown, the batter, Medford and Grants Pass Southern Oregon league ball clubs will fly at each others' throats in the local loop inaugural. The encounter will take place at the high school park before what is expected to be a record-shattering audience.

Catching the fast slants of Prehall Coleman, who in private life is justice of the peace of the Medford district, will be Constable Nick Young. Slugger Brown, who does considerable shuffling of Jackson county when he isn't participating in opening-day baseball ceremonies, has vowed to "hit one a mile." Prehall Coleman just laughs at the threat and says he'll whiff the big slugger.

A gala, spectacular opening-day ball game is assured. In addition to the trio of above-named gentlemen who will explode the local season, a long list of 21 prizes has been donated by Medford merchants for Crater players. There will be awards for probably every member of the Medford team.

A public address system will keep fans informed of action taking place on the field of battle.

Manager Wally Rickett of the Craters will not announce his hurling selection until just before game-time. It will be either Bill Rathke or Ray Erickson, righthanders, or Lowell Brown, big southpaw first-baseman. In case Brown goes to the rubber, Tommy White will take over the initial cushion.

For Grants Pass, Manager Jud Pernoll plans to start his brilliant righthander, Steve Crippen, in the box, with Al Rogers back of the plate. Crippen sprung a huge surprise last Sunday when he beat Crescent City, last year's champions, 10 to 5 in the league opener, and Manager Pernoll, himself a former major league pitcher, is confident the youngster will hurl Grants Pass to the pennant.

Boasting one of the heaviest-hitting Medford teams in many years, the Craters will attempt to make it four straight wins today, and the second in league action. Last Sunday, the local blazes three Ashland pitchers for 22 hits and a 17 to 9 victory, while Ray Erickson was best chumping great baseball. In pre-season games, the Craters defeated the Klamath Falls Red Sox and Mt. White losing to the Bellingham Chinooks of the Western International league.

Glendale, Medford and Grants Pass are tied for the top of the heap with one victory and no defeats, and a win today for either club will send it winning off to a flying start in the first half of the 16-game pennant battle.

Arba Ager, bullet-arm Crater third sacker, injured his shoulder in the Ashland game and may not start today. In case he doesn't see action, Billy Calvert will hold down the hot corner. If Ager starts, Calvert and Russ Achosen will alternate in left field. Remainder of the Medford team will be the same.

Manager Rickett has announced the release of Larry Pepper, righthanded pitcher, to make way for George, a sidarm righthanded hurler who played in the old Utah-Idaho league. Ashland announced the signing of Phil Griggs, righthanded pitcher with Grants Pass last year, and Clay Lewis, a six foot five inch, righthanded hurler from San Bernardino, Cal.

CORVALLIS, May 14.—(AP)—The University of Oregon enlarged its string of dual track meet victories today by defeating a scrappy Oregon State college team which made its best showing of the year in losing, 73 1/2 to 57 1/2.

Mac Robinson, Oregon's Olympic games phenom, led his teammate, Buck and Leslie of Oregon State by nearly 10 feet in clipping a tenth of a second off the old 100-yard dash meet record of 9.7 seconds. Hal Higgins of O.S.C. last year was the last of four runners to equal the former mark.

The negro flash also took first in the broad jump and the 220-yard dash for 15 points and meet honors. He led Leslie of Oregon State by fully 25 feet in the 220.

Defenses of O.S.C. was believed to have set a new high jump mark until official measurement showed his jump to have been 6 feet 2 1/2 inches instead of 6 feet 4 inches as first announced.

The Staters showed unexpected strength in the 440. Teats, Hampton and Pank finishing in that order to sweep all three places. The same trio, with Leslie, won the mile relay with a 75-yard lead in the finish.

Teats was high point man for the Staters with 6 1/2, followed by Carlson with 6 from two second places in the hurdles.

The meet was run off in perfect weather.

NEW YORK, May 14.—(AP)—The two major leagues came up with an almost new set of batting leaders today after road trips and batting slumps had wrecked the averages of some of last week's pace-setters and others just found the pace too hot.

A pair who hadn't been to the plate often enough to be rated as "regulars" last Saturday, Joe DiMaggio of the New York Yankees and Harry (Cook) Lavagetto of the Brooklyn Dodgers, moved to the head of the rival parades. Each had 19 hits in 45 times at bat through yesterday's games for .422 averages.

Cleveland's Hal Trotsky, American league leader last week with .434, hit only six times in 18 efforts and dropped to third at .408, a point behind Frank Hayes of the Athletics, who held second place despite an eight-point drop.

Chuck Klein of the Phillies, who had been on top of the National league, was nowhere to be seen in today's "first ten." He hit safely only once in nine times up through the week and wound up at the .333 mark, far behind the tenth man, Mel Ott of the New York Giants.

Joe Medwick, the St. Louis Cardinal's clouter, worked the other way to take second place at .404. His nine hits in 17 times hoisted his average 59 points and he came up from sixth place.

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Flying the sapphire blue and gold silks of William Du Pont Jr.'s Foxcatcher farm, the chestnut son of Pennant-Ship o'War, second in the derby, lived up to his reputation as a great muddier. He went to the post the 3-to-2 choice of the rain-soaked and chilled crowd of 25,000 and he didn't disappoint.

Under the guidance of Maurice (Moose) Peters, the Foxcatcher ace tossed slop and mud in the faces of eight worthy rivals, finishing the mile and three-sixteenths of America's richest race for three-year-olds with seven lengths to spare over Thurston, B. Martin's Grant, a rank outsider. Hal Price Hedley's Menor, the early pace setter as he was in the derby, was third, losing runner-up honors by a nose as Jack Westrop brought Grant from far back in the final drive.
