This outstanding young singer has appeared on several occasions as soloist with the Portland Symphony orchestra under the direction of William Von Hoogstraten. She was chosen from many aspirants for the solo part at the Portland orchestra's last matinee program in February.

She has a pleasant personality, a large repertoire and delights in pleasing her audiences with many and varied selections.

Boleros Important Summer Fashion of All Type Clothes

PARIS—(UP)—Take your boleros straight, long, short or with a dash of embroidery. But be sure to consider them as necessities for pepping up an appetite for fashions.

Jean Dessea's summer creations sanction the bolero vehemently. Some may not want their bolero separate. Very well. Then the same effect may be gained by deep raglan sleeves which terminate at the shoulder end in inset colored bands following the armhole curve, but set in so deep on the bodice that they give the effect of a bolero.

As for more orthodox boleros, they range in materials from velvet and silk fringe to mousseline and grosgrain. If you happen to have a last year's black and white print silk dress and matching bolero you may simply tack onto the bolero a deep peplum of black mousseline which follows up the front and fastens itself in a fluffy bow on the left shoulder.

To a bouffant black lace evening gown (or it may be bouffant anything) add a perfectly plain and very short black velvet bolero — with rounded corners, of course — and stitch a black velvet corselet tight around your waist and hips. The variety in boleros seems never-ending. One of the neatest effects is achieved by Dessea by simply making three deep wide scallops on the bottom of a bolero.

If you want to go really elegant, try one of these: a bolero-hawley made of long white silk fringe falling from a triangle apex downward, of white silk crepe which forms the back; or make a bolero of white satin. The short sleeves of the latter have all their top fullness caught into an unpressed pleat which continues down the front as a deep and soft roll collar.

There's still another style which reminds you with a pleasant jolt that the bolero is, after all, Spanish. This adaptation is of black mousseline worn over a dinner dress of the same cloud-like material. Motifs of gold leather, which embroider the sides of the bolero, are so heavy that they look like thick golden metal.
